I thought the story itself was cute, but that the dialogue was very stilted and that there were a lot of characters that I had a hard time keeping them all straight. I wonder if a young reader would have that same difficulty.

This should have been an easy, quick read. But it wasn't exactly geared towards children, although the context and sibling squabbling was performed with a juvenile vibe.

Certain things didn't even make sense to my seven year old nephew, who inquired "Was it hot?" when the human boy walked into his room and turned on the ceiling fan (when Andy was perched). It was added for the plot and anyone would think the spider would have SPLAT on the wall. But there is no follow up or anything.

And when I read: "You took something of mine, and I want it back."

Charlie rolled his eyes. "Emily was never yours to begin with. Why can't you just leave her alone?"

"I am going to make a deal with you," Harry said. "If you want to see your family again, you will agree to my terms."

My nephew wanted to know HOW did Harry know Charlie didn't still have Emily? Hmm. How did Harry know Charlie didn't still have Emily?

It's one thing when kids ask off the wall questions. But sometimes we want to read a book, not make up a new story as we go along!

The previous excerpt was after a timeline heading of "several weeks later" right after we left Emily and Andy with the human boy, where Emily wanted to stay "a while". Who'd think it would be weeks later? So of course, my nephew wanted to know where the spiders were ...

Too jumbly with too many characters make this a disjointed book for the young ones. Too many plot holes to make it enjoyable for an older audience.

Not recommended and would not follow this writer nor series.
