Gwendolyn vs. the Band of Barren Hearts reminds us that bad things can happen to good people. After her parents passed, bright-eyed American sweetheart Gwen was thrust into the foster system and finds herself a new foster daughter to sadistic and cruel foster parents. The only solace Gwen finds in her new Hell is her foster brother, Welch.

When situations reach a breaking point-- its now or never--and both Gwen and Welch will have to live with the consequences of their actions.

But our love isn't strong enough, rich enough, or smart enough to buy us a future.

The majority of this story is told through Gwen's point of view- naturally the reader has very subjective emotions at the horrors Gwen witnesses. I sure felt a mixed bag of emotions while reading this-- disgust, triumph, sorrow, irritation, ...the list could go on! And at the very end I needed to sit in silence for a while- just to process what all happened. This was a very intense read for me.

Gwen was a character I both loved and hated. She was strong-willed, fierce, and had a poetic narrative. However, if you thought Anastasia's inner goddess was bad- she has nothing on Gwen's "monster" ramblings. There were points where Gwen's thoughts were on a runaway train and became overly repetitive and left me with a feeling she was overly haughty.

Welch tugged at my heartstrings throughout the story. He's one of the few male main characters I've ever read that had such a hard life but refused to be broken down. Welch is a true representation of what the human spirit can endure and get through. *sniff*

Overall, **a solid 4.5 star read**- wonderfully unique, beautiful although rushed dark romance, and has elements of a thriller. I would highly recommend this - but beware! This is not for the faint of heart and contains triggers for all forms of abuse.

This is a super graphic dark book. I was in a dark mood, I wanted something a little dramatic and kind of taboo and I did get it.

So you have two foster kids, Gwen and Welch. This is a true love-story, with a lot of wicked stuff. Gwen and Welch have awful foster parents who do awful things. Here's my take on this book. The first 50% was good. I was interested in the painful part, the abuse. Gwen and Welch only have each other and because of that, they sort of form this bond.

I thought the bond was kind of forced. I think if there was a little more angst (I know I can't believe I said that), but it's true. Instead of (view spoiler) I don't know, it just felt off to me.

The second half the book felt really forced to me. The author continues to tell me what a monster Gwen and Welch are, but I really didn't see it. Yes, they had to do bad things because they became tainted and horrible people, but I felt like they were doing what they needed to do to survive.

I'm not really fond of an author telling me my feelings. Telling me someone is bad, a monster and should die. I rather read it through the actions and emotions of the characters.

What really get you hooked into the story are all the BAD things. This isn't a cookie-cutter book and shouldn't be read by the faint of heart. It's really sick, twisted and more than just rape happens.

There are also killings that are detailed in the book (like super detailed).

I had the honor of working with Mary E Palmerin on this book. While she was no stranger to the dark evilness in this world with her first series, this was a new adventure for her and I feel she did an outstanding job. She made it very clear to me in the beginning she wanted this story to be a realistic message of how far

the system pushes teenagers who find themselves in foster care. While what you are about to read isn't the usual outcome for those kids, what Gwen and Welch endures is common more often than should be allowed. It was important to Mary that the readers see how far society pushes people into the blackness of survival only to punish them for what they had to do to stay alive. I am very proud of her because I think she took a huge challenge and won with this book.

Gwen's life suddenly changed at the death of her parents. From being the beloved daughter and center of her parents' world, she now finds herself with Claude and Helen, in a rundown trailer. Her value in life was reduced to a monthly paycheck from the state. With no one to care about her now, no goals for the future other than survive; Gwen has to reclaim a new identity, one that will help her find the fight to save herself. She needed to discover the monster that was within her soul that she never wanted to nurture.

Welch is her new foster brother; he wants to connect with Gwen. He knows the abuse that goes on in the trailer, he has suffered at the hands of Helen and Claude for too long, and seen to many other girls come and go. Maybe with Gwen they can plan their escape as soon as they both turn 18. The time to run had come, but as with everything freedom doesn't come for free. Life on the outside of that trailer wasn't any kinder to them and a new level of angst had begun to smother them. When it came time to pay for their sins, they find they are also paying for the sins of every person who had laid a hand on them in the past or had forgotten that they were only kids who needed help.

I am not sure how you can read this book and not have your heart shattered by what is done to these two kids, who only wanted a chance to chase their dreams, finish school and know what high school love was like. The author kept it real; she didn't pull any punches with the tragedy that Welch and Gwen call their life now. Each was willing to become the monster the other needed in order to make it out of this alive. I was impressed with how she weaved love into one of the darkest situations a teenager could find, not the fly by night kind of love, but the self-sacrificing love that people rarely find or can give.

I strongly suggest you grab your copy of this book now, get some tissues and be prepared to find within yourself the power to change situations like this.

This book was all about the good, the bad and the very ugly.

The good = Gwendolyn and Welch

The bad = Claude and Helen

The ugly = everything that happens between them.

After the loss of her parents Gwendolyn is placed in foster care shortly before her 18th birthday. It is there that she meets Welch, who is also in foster care in the same home. Not long after arriving Gwen falls victim to Claude and Helen, her very sick and depraved foster parents. Abused in the most horrific ways Gwen and Welch band together for protection and comfort but it's not enough. Abuse changes people and for Gwen and Welch it leads them down a path of heartbreak, pain and destruction.

This book is not your typical dark romance. There is no kidnapping, the evil monster doesn't change his ways and fall for the fragile girl. This is a story about young teens who are abused and used by the people who are supposed to care for them which makes it even that much more difficult to read.

I love dark books. I love dark romance. I am straight up addicted to dark erotica! There is a third dark category too; one that I rarely read since I find it to be so depressing. I refer to this third category as, "sad dark". This book definitely belongs in this third category and is by far the saddest book I've ever read. Although it's been years since I've read a book that pulled on my heartstrings like this book did, it wasn't depressing. My heart ached for some of the characters while I felt rage and hatred towards others. The fact that I felt so many emotions proves how powerful Mary E. Palmerin's writing is!

This book is about a 17-year-old boy and a 17-year-old girl who share a room in a tiny trailer owned by sadistic, "foster parents". The majority of the first half of the book focuses on the female main character Gwendolyn. Poor freaking Gwendolyn! Maybe a month or a few months shy of her 18th birthday, she is living in hell. Although she tries not to talk to anyone, afraid of forming relationships and being hurt again, she is forced into situations that cause her to grow close to her roommate and schoolmate, "Welch". Welch and Gwen aren't anything like the sadistic couple who foster them, yet Gwen and Welch still refer to themselves as, "monsters". In this book, Gwen learns that not all monsters are ugly or scary. Gwen discovers that being abused is horrific, painful and heartbreaking yet she also learns that not all pain hurts.

Normally I would never give 5 stars to a book containing typos and inconsistencies or that was as disorganized as this book is. However, the depth of depravity and darkness in this book totally overpowered the poor editing! Palmerin wasn't afraid to push boundaries - actually, she didn't just push boundaries, she totally disregarded them! This was a new author for me. Thank you, Mary for letting me read and review your work.

Warning: Dark Elements, Forced Non-Con, and Murder.

This was an unique mix of dark. Not sure I've read young dark characters like this before. How long do you play with monsters before you turn into one? Gwendolyn's parents are gone, leaving her a orphan with DISGUSTING, sadistic foster parents. Welch, her foster brother is broke, he's damaged from the life of pain he's lived, the torture he's endured through the years. Can they heal together or are they forever doomed for a life of hell? Can two damaged souls mend each other?

I had mixed feelings about this one. The plot/storyline was original, dark, and completely out of the box. But I wasn't actually convinced Gwen was a monster, I think she was living the best way she could. Her life was turned upside down with the death of her parents, she was fighting for freedom from the real monsters.

Monster was a term used quite frequently, but I didn't think so. She wasn't the monster in this story and neither was Welch. I was told, but never really felt it. Their circumstances were heartbreaking more so than most dark stories, their ages playing a huge part. The scenes between Gwen and Welch was disturbingly beautiful. I don't know how to explain it, dark but sweet. Weird, I know.

"I have to do things to you, Gwendolyn. Bad things to you-," he pauses, clenching his jaw and scrunching his eyebrows."

This had a vibe of Bonnie & Clyde, younger version of course. There's twists and turns, speed bumps that you don't expect, and a certain naivety about these characters that you can't help but love.
