Suddenly Augie was hot. While his wife, Nina, continued to mourn, his friends began to awaken to the realization that all those paintings Augie had given them over the years might have been worth holding on to. In fact, according to the New York art dealer who was also Augie's agent, they might be worth a whole lot. So when Augie returns from the "dead," having been shipwrecked on an island off Cuba, it is with somewhat mixed emotions that he is welcomed home. His wife is jubilant, but all those who had read dollar signs in Augie's obituary aren't too sure how happy they are to have him back, especially since each of them seems to need an influx of cash in the worst way. And when mysterious things start happening to Augie, little "accidents" that seem less than accidental, he's not too sure how happy he is to be back either. With the help, however, of his wife and their fiercely loyal houseboy, Reuben the Cuban, Augie fights for his life a second time around while seeking out the would-be killer. Cleaning out an old book case, came across this and reread it. It's fast paced, funny, Florida comic crime fiction - the Key West scene is brought to life, Augie, Nina and Reuben are good characters.

Where *Florida Straits* was fast and fun, *Scavenger Reef* is a leisurely character study. Augie Silver is a famous artist, known past Mile Marker 20 for his paintings and known in Key West for his generosity and easy friendship. The book begins at Augie's memorial service. He was lost at sea, presumed dead, and the people in his life deal with the void his absence leaves. His wife, his agent, his friends — each feels his loss in different ways. It quickly becomes apparent that, as laid-back and unassuming as Augie was, he was the linchpin that held everything together. There is humor here, dark humor for sure, and the pace picks up as some of the characters start getting desperate. Then the Mob gets involved ...

The pacing is slower in this book, especially at the beginning. There are a number of characters, and their flaws and strengths slowly weave an intriguing story. It's hard for me to categorize this book; it's not humor, although it has some great dark-humor moments. It's not a thriller, though there's definitely a whodunit element. We run into some familiar characters that we met in *Florida Straits*, but this book isn't tied to that one. Overall, a satisfying read, more for savoring than rushing through.

The basic story of *Scavenger Reef* is that a painter is lost at sea and is presumed dead. Friends and associates who have some of his paintings start to realize they have a windfall in the value of paintings he's given them. When the painter turns up alive, it turns out that someone is trying to kill him to protect and realize the windfall.

This is all written by an expert in South Florida-style comedy and the action is replete with all that should make you expect such as mafia goons holding characters over aquarium tanks containing hammerhead sharks because they haven't paid their loan sharks. All-in-all, I should love this story. I remember loving it when I read it.

The thing is, I almost abandoned it during the re-read. The pacing is terrible. Almost a half of the book fritters away thinking the painter is dead. That's by far the less interesting part of the story. A good argument

can be made that you should start with the return of the painter and fill in the backstory. Instead, it felt like it dragged on forever. It picked up and I'm glad that I finished it, especially since I plan to continue with the series, but it is weaker from initial slowness.

The tale turned dark when the parrot died. Until then, the narrative had been a mildly amusing riff on how an artist's works may suddenly appreciate after they die. When Key West artist Augie Silver was apparently lost at sea, the New York prices for his works increased dramatically, providing an apparent windfall for his agent and the various impecunious drinking buddies whom Augie had gifted with his paintings over the years. The castaway's apparent return from the dead on the eve of the big auction of his works causes consternation. When Fred, Augie's faithful parrot, keels over after eating a poisoned Key lime tart intended for his owner, it becomes apparent that one or more of his oddball pals is seeking to return Augie to the ranks of the deceased. At that point the novel becomes less humorous.

Author Shamus communicates the heat and ambiance of Key West. However, his over the top descriptive passages sometimes get in the way of the story. In the middle of a police interrogation of Augie on page 253, we are suddenly treated to this passage:

Fat summer clouds towered here and there. Their bottoms were lavender, they were voluptuous with swelling curves, and they roamed the sky like sniffing dogs, deliberating as to where they'd drop their rain.

The first book in the series wasn't quite as sarcastically funny as Hiaasen, and not as spastic as Dorsey, but it was good in it's own right. *Scavenger Reef* doesn't disappoint and my only real gripe is it seemed to resolve really quickly. I'm not sure if he was in a hurry to finish, but I could have used a little more build up leading to the big reveal.

With that said, I fell for one of the herrings at the end, but really enjoyed finding out who did it. Or tried to do it.

Characters from the first book have cameos, and I like it when books in a series pull characters in from other books. It helps build the world the series is set in better, so props for that. While some of his characters border cookie cutter land (Reuben the Gay Cuban), it isn't enough to detract from a decent story.

I'll keep reading the series at this point unless Shames just totally blows it. All in all a fun read, if you need something Hiaasen/Dorsey-esque but not quite as heavy, you will probably derive some amusement and enjoyment out of this one.
