As promised, the focus is once again on Isabeau. This book closely follows the pattern set in book four by focusing on Isabeau's adventures almost exclusively. Kate Forsyth then masterfully manages to bring this story right in line with the events portrayed in book four so that by the end of the book, both stories converge seamlessly. There is also what I am assuming is a setup for book six in that we get a few inside glimpses into the Fairgean. It all makes for some very interesting reading. However, that is not all. As if Isabeau is not facing enough challenges, Margit of Arran kidnaps both the Righ's son and his cousin and our poor heroine is framed for the crime! This puts her in the position of having to go rescue the two boys and leads to a surprise encounter with a previous character.

Fans of Isabeau will be pleased, fans of the entire series will be even more so. Kate Forsyth has several very impressive talents. The level of research, the characterization, the way she weaves the story lines together and the pace are all indicative of a master storyteller. I love the way she gives hints of what is coming,

without giving anything away. For example, in this book, she tells a story about the Fairgean that has no real purpose or bearing on the main storyline, but it does not interrupt the flow either. There is no possible reason for the story except to prepare and make you look forward to events that will occur in book six. Well, that combined with the cliffhanger ending. The pace in this book is fast. Much more so than the previous ones in the series and felt like the writer was rushing us along to finish as soon as possible. While this made for a interesting read, it neglected some detail and some pivotal conclusions in the story felt neglected in the telling.

As she struggles to assimilate into the foreign culture and survive the rite of passage to the skull of the world, she is set out on a path of self-discovery-- to her ultimate power. Meanwhile, Maya is scheming the downfall of Lachlan, and to have her daughter, Bronwen, placed back on the throne.

As with the past four books, there is plenty of fast-paced adventure and great character development. I find Isabeau and Maya among the most engaging of the characters, and I was glad to see them return in this book. I particularly enjoyed the conflict and tension that arises from the two women's grudging friendship pitted against their morals, goals, and loved ones, and their mutual love of Bronwen juxtaposed against the jealousy for her love.
