This simple introduction to tigers is designed for students just beginning to read on their own. Through vivid color photos and simple text, young readers are introduced to tigers' lives, along with a bit about their plight and what is being done to preserve them in the wild.

The text and photos mention white tigers and the fact that they are more likely to be seen in captivity than the wild, but does not delve into the problems involved with the production of these highly-inbred animals for the captive trade.

Brief description: Young readers are introduced to information about tigers including habitat, appearance, diet and ways to help threatened tiger populations.

Identify at least 2 characteristics of this genre and subgenre and discuss how they appear in your book:

Reference aids: This book is set up with features that help readers find information easily and organize the facts that are displayed. Bold headings indicate the topic for each page, captions explain the photos and a glossary and index help readers find information and meaning quickly and easily.

Format: This easy reader nonfiction book is well designed for young readers. The print is large and unencumbered by the photographs and text features. Simple labels and captions provide meaning without

requiring a lot of reading skill and fun questions are presented on several pages that require readers to turn the book upside down to reveal the answers.

In what ways and how well does the book as a whole serve its intended audience?: "Tigers" will both serve to teach early readers about the topic as well as introduce them to nonfiction texts in a friendly and accessible way. Young students will be able to become familiar with the qualities of nonfiction in a way that is developmentally appropriate and engaging.
