The general theme is about overcoming obstacles, and dealing with the path life pushes you down. It is about nontraditional love - love of friends, and people who come into your life, sometimes when you least expect them or in ways you could never imagine.

This is a story unlike any other I have ever read.

Liz Davis's talent with putting words together makes you understand the story and feel the emotions the characters are experiencing.

I have never lived anywhere one must show papers to prove they belong, to get permits to be allowed to act and experience what I have always taken for granted. But I have a friend who is as devoted and loyal and would go to the lengths for me that these women go to for each other.

Writing this makes me want to pick up a phone and call her.

The characters in this story are strong in the beginning, and still we see them grow. We experience their setbacks and wonder what we would do in their situation. When true complications and disaster strike, even though foreshadowed, I wanted to be able to help in some way.

Liz Grace Davis' novel Honeysuckle and Jasmine tells the story of two African women trying to make lives for themselves in Germany. The characters are fascinating; one woman struggling with hurts of the past while the other suffers in the present, one stronger in action while the other is stronger in intent, and both facing problems not of their own devises. The plot is convincing and powerful. And the insights into the plight of immigrants, legal or otherwise, are intensely relevant the world over.

It takes a special sort of bravery to leave a world behind. While Senia, the narrator, may feel she's run away from her troubles, or even been rescued, it's her own strength which will sustain her. And Miina shows a constant desire to help others, suddenly thwarted when she needs help herself. The girls' bravery leads them into actions that might seem scary on the outside—from harboring a fugitive to going on a dating show—but their constancy makes sense in the light of risks already taken. Readers are quickly drawn into the two girls' circle of friendship, shared experiences, and hope for the future.

Nicely told in a convincing mix of first and third person narration, the story build an image of German town life, people both generous and cruel, unintended harm, and unencumbered joy. The longing to feel normal might be greater for an immigrant, or a wounded woman, but it's an emotion most of us can relate to, and the author draws it well. An underlying love story builds hope on top of the lingering effects of abuse, and the two women's laughter truly is the best medicine.

This story could be downbeat and depressing, but instead it's a delight, a revelation, and a joy, with wonderful messages of hope hidden between the lines. It's highly recommended.
