In this second installment from the St. Augustus Chronicles, 8-year-old Chelsa Moran is the victim of a terrible car accident. The accident leaves Chelsa in a comatose state suffering from extensive brain damage. The doctor recommends Chelsa be taken off life-support. Tim and Melanie Moran fight over the decision as to whether to continue to allow their daughter to exist in a vegetative state with little hope of recovery. Tim prevails to keep Chelsa alive. His decision and the discovery that Melanie was pregnant by her boss, John Cantrell, a man she was having an affair with for purposes of bolstering her career shoved them down the aisle of divorce.

Six-years later, Sienna Cantrell, Melanie's second daughter with now husband John Cantrell, is happy and healthy except for some unexplained fainting spells. Psychiatrist Rand Morrissey is brought in to try to diagnose the problem. Traditional explanations fall by the wayside one-by-one. In the meantime, Chelsa was receiving nerve stimulation treatments in a final hope to revive her brain functions. Turning to hypnosis therapy, Dr. Rand discovers an unsettling connection between Chelsa's memories and Sienna's fainting spells, particularly since Sienna had no knowledge that she even had a half-sister. Dr. Rand follows his investigation through a maze of leads that emerge in the field of the theological theory of spiritual Limbo. Add to this the engaging backstories of Dr. Rand and Melanie, along with Melanie's natural predilection for deceit and manipulation and you have a rollercoaster ride of intrigue.

Limboland is a riveting, well-written, page-turner of a medical thriller that I highly recommend.
