However, I would have preferred a stronger plot which may have made the story less passive and a more compulsive read.

I appreciated the idea behind this, and the appendix at the back telling readers where donations to international cave rescues can be made, but I didn't feel this novel lived up to the opinions of 'deliciously

dark' and 'totally gripping' on the back. I thought this was a good idea; one sister being called in the middle of the night to inform her that her sister has been discovered missing whilst on a cave dive in Mexico, but disappointingly I found the novel lacking. It didn't feel like it went into enough detail, just skimmed the surface and the writing felt quite juvenile. I also would have liked Rafa and Anya's experience in the cave to be explored a lot more.

The story is told from the point of view of both sisters but also flits between present day and their teenage years. There was a bit too much jumping around for me and would have preferred it to focus more on the present day story.

The story opens with Anya, gleeful that she is in Mexico in a warm climate with a good looking guy escaping January in the UK where her sister Kate, married with a baby, and will be shivering in the winter cold.

A late night telephone call to Kate informs her that her younger sister Anya has been missing for two days. She was last seen with a diving instructor in a relatively isolated region of Mexico. Police have recovered her clothes and personal belongings, and they are now sending divers down to the caves. Kate goes into melt down, and I mean melt down, she screams kidnapping, abduction, and proceeds to alert everyone she can think of. The Foreign office act as intermediary, but still Kate goes off at a tangent, unwittingly putting her sister in further danger.

The story is related from two first person's point of view, that of Kate and Anya. As the story unfolds we learn of a family tragedy that could go some way to explaining Kate's totally over the top reaction to the fact that her sister is missing. Her parents now separated, her husband suggesting caution until we have more facts, Kate refuses to listen to anyone. She wants action.

Whilst part of the narrative is by Anya, we do not know what has happened to her, she is clearly in trouble, scared and alone, but where or why we don't know. The author cleverly racks up the tension as we become aware that wherever, Anya is, time is running out.

A psychological suspense, that only begins to make sense as Anya alone and frightened relives a period she has tried to put behind her.

When this book came through my letterbox, I was instantly intrigued by it. The cover alone is compelling, it hints at something deep and mysterious to come, and from reading the blurb on the back, I was all the more interested and keen to find out what lay ahead for me in this story.

Little Sister opens with a Prologue in which Anya is travelling in a truck with a handsome man towards adventure. Wild and free, Anya has spontaneously gone on holiday and is about to go diving with an instructor, Rafa. We are then transported to a few days later in England. It is one am, and Kate's mobile rings, waking her and her husband Rob. A man on the other end of the phone tells Kate that he is ringing from Mexico and that there has been an incident. Police have recovered her sister Anya's clothes near a poolside in a deserted area of Mexico, and not only that, but she was last seen getting into a vehicle with a man and he is also missing. All of a sudden, the race is on, and Kate must find her younger sister before it is too late.

Wow is all I have to say about this story. Just wow. As soon as I read the first page i was hooked, and by the start of the second chapter I desperately felt for Kate and wanted to reach out to her. I felt myself channelling her emotions, I personally had an awful feeling in my stomach as I read about how the police had found Anya's clothes and I felt Kate's pain and heartache reflected in my own emotions. I read this story very quickly, from the start i was physically unable to put it down and raced through it, hoping with Kate that Anya would turn up.

Lucy Dawson has done a wonderful job of creating believable, relatable characters that we take right into our hearts and souls. The story is written from three different people's perspectives, one of them being Kate's. I really liked this style of writing as I honestly felt like I was in Kate's mind, seeing what she was seeing, and feeling the same motions as the ones she was going through. It was the perfect way to write a story of this subject, it really drew me in that much more, made the story more personal to me, and allowed me to be involved with the characters and the scenes.
