I admit, when I started reading this, I thought I wouldn't enjoy it as much as the first one because it followed a different character. Luckily, it didn't take long for me to be proven VERY wrong! I LOVED this, at least to the same extent I loved the first one, if not a tiny bit more!

I really enjoyed that this book could be read as a sequel to the first book or as a standalone. Information from the first book is repeated in such a way that it would bring an unfamiliar reader up to speed on what happened, but not bore a reader already familiar with the world and events. I must say, it was very refreshing to see this done in such a way – usually I'm left wanting to skip over things like that.

The overall writing/editing has much improved from the first book as well, which I was very pleased to see. There were only a few (less than a handful, I'd say) small errors that briefly caught my eye, though none so bad that I lingered on them.

If I had to choose one criticism I would have to say it's that the characters are quite oblivious to things immediately in front of them sometimes. But note that I say this with a lighthearted giggle and grin, following far too many nights of me shouting at them through my Kindle. It's definitely not a flaw at all, so I'm really not even sure I can call it a criticism of any importance!
