Tessa Harlow enjoyed leading hiking tours until the hike that had a nightmarish ending. Feeling tremendous guilt and responsibility for the incident she goes to her father's home to heal. From the time of the accident she has flashbacks from her early childhood - memories that don't make sense. Feeling a pull to the area where she spent the first years of her life, Tessa heads to New Mexico to scout possible hiking tours and that's where her journey really begins. By meeting people who are new to her but from her past Tessa starts to put pieces together that lead her to the truth of her early years.

I enjoyed Tessa's journey of discovery and how she learns to make reparations. It seems that more than a few characters in the book are looking for a way to make amends in their lives and find that they can help each other along the way. The depth given to the major characters had me pulling for each one. My favorite was Natalie, the daughter of Tessa's lover. Natalie is grieving the loss of her mother and is acting out. This book doesn't belong in the top tier because it's not life-changing or edifying in any way, but boy does it entertain! It was the quintessential "beach book" and, if truth be told, probably a "chick book." It was just what I needed to push away the winter doldrums and get my mind off anything stressful, and I carried it with me so I could read whenever I was waiting for anything (dentist's office, meetings, etc.).

Tessa Harlow is recuperating from an injury sustained when a landslide occurred while she was leading a hiking tour group in the mountains and one of the members was swept into the river and drowned. Tessa's own rescue from the river awakened long-dormant memories of a similar rescue when she was a child, an accident about which her father has been strangely quiet, though it was responsible for her mother's death.

Drawn to the New Mexico town of Las Ladronas and thinking it would be the ideal destination for a future tour group, Tessa finds herself embroiled in a series of strange emotions and coincidences that add layer upon layer to the mystery of her life and questions about the relationships between people in the story who seem to be so drawn to each other. Of course there is delicious love interest in the person of Vince Grasso, a handsome widower with three appealing little girls, one of whom is troubled over the death of her own mother and to whom Tessa feels especially drawn.

The book's appeal is heightened by the charming presence of very affectionate dogs and the sprinkling of real recipes (the author is actually a food professional herself). The recipes remind the reader of the power of good, nourishing food, lovingly prepared, to comfort and heal.

Another incredible offering from Barbara O'Neal, who is now an auto-buy for me, no questions asked. This book had a little bit of a different feel than both *Lost Recipe* and *Perfect Life*, but O'Neal's stunning language and insightful, poignant voice shines through from the first chapter. I absolutely loved this book. I had been on a run of reading fairly serious novels (The Historian, The Secret of the Wind), and had been looking for some light reads. Just before I received this goodreads giveaway, I had read an absolutely dreadful, formulaic chick lit/romance. So I probably wasn't in the best frame of mind when I started this one. Interesting premise, but unknown author and very few expectations.

Right off the bat I was smitten with Tess. Tess is in her late 30s, the child of a hippie surfer dad who followed renaissance festivals performing magic during Tess's childhood, and is now settled with a margarita stand and a surfboard in California. Her mother died when Tess was a child, and all Tess really knows about her early childhood was that she and her parents lived in a New Mexico commune.

Tess works as an adventure guide, and after a tour gone bad, she is left with some vague returning memories, and some time off to heal from her physical injuries. She decides to combine a work fact-finding trip with business and return to the area of the commune.

I thought this was a unique and interesting setting, and found the interspersed recipes neat and appropriate to the story. Once Tess arrives in the area of the commune (now an organic farm/bakery), she finds a variety of interesting people, and an up and coming tourist area. She also crosses paths with Vince, a single dad of three little girls.

Vince has all the attributes of a good romance hero, but he's also a caring, decent man who has his own baggage. Vince and Tess have an instant attraction, but aren't interested in anything long-term. They are absolutely perfect together, and their romantic scenes are beautifully written. I enjoy a little romance (okay, sex) but I'm a grown-up and don't need a pornographic tutorial.

There are a myriad of characters sprinkled throughout; Tess's dad, local cafe owner Vita, abuse victim and recent parolee Annie, Vince's eccentric and troubled oldest daughter Natalie, and a mysterious man lurking around town.

I couldn't get through this story fast enough to find what Tess would learn or remember about her early history, and how the romance with Vince would play out. The ending was eminently satisfying, and absolutely right.

The only sticking point I had was the resolution of the mysterious man. I thought that was odd and didn't really fit. But otherwise I completely loved this book; it reaffirmed my belief that there are romantic fiction writers who actually put some thought into their stories and strive for realistic characters and situations. I can't wait to read more by this author, and I absolutely want to try some of the recipes!

After a tragic accident on a hike she was leading, Tessa returns to Las Ladronas, the town in New Mexico where she was born. Living with almost overwhelming grief she starts searching for answers to questions that have long been buried. Questions of her childhood and the hippie commune where she lived the first years of her life.

While there she meets Vince, a single father who is raising his three daughters, one of whom is still grieving the devastating loss of her mother.

It's hard to avoid superlatives with this book. It's just amazing, it's a journey of forgiveness, and perhaps even redemption. As Tessa pulls at the threads of her past she forms an unlikely bond with Vince's troubled daughter and together they are able to learn to move forward again. Again...TOO much description --lacking a sense of purpose with the plot.

However: I am not a 'Foodie person myself. (so I found it all so dull and boring). Besides, I cook better!

I'm almost 60 years old. I know how to cook. I know about fresh hearty food --organic --and good meals.... but its a 'part' of my life....NOT my life.

Also: Our main Character was a *TRAVELER*....(not a cook) ---yet the THEME (the SECRET??) -- is in the FOOD??? ---ie: home, family, love, relationship?!)...

I'd give this three and a half stars. For the most part I liked the main character, Tessa Harlow, who leads high end adventure tour hikes with diversions for nice restaurants. Sounds like a good gig to me. But after recovering from injuries in a terrible accident on a hike, she heads to the town of Los Ladrones in New Mexico to search for her past while scouting possible future tour locations. Born in a commune and raised by a former hippie surfer dude, she had nearly drowned in the river there as a child, but had no recollection of the events, only what her father had told her. When she had her traumatic injury, she had flashed back to the time she nearly drowned as a child. Further explorations lead to more flashbacks. She also meets a man and promptly falls into his strong muscled arms (there's a steamy - in both ways - bathroom scene for starters). Vince, the love interest, is a likeable guy, a widower overwhelmed with rearing three young daughters. He's almost a bit too heroic -- great looking, hot, muscular fire and rescue worker who's devoted to his girls. He

seemed like a character in a made-for-TV movie or a typical romance. He hits on her at a restaurant, they feel sparks, etc. Too formulaic romance type stuff for me. All the people Tessa meets end up being connected to her past, surprise, surprise. I read this book on the recommendation of Sarah Addison Allen, an author I enjoy. While there was a touch of magical realism at the end, it was not like the dominant feature of S.A. Allen's books. There was also a foodie element with recipes, both of which would lead to comparisons with Allen's work, but they seemed very different. This book had a mild metaphysical tone with psychic foreshadowing and the character sought redemption in a Christian ritual, so it had a soulful quality. But the dogs were the most soulful of all (and there's a cat, too, for cat lovers). Though I'm no cook, the recipes sounded delicious, but I'm not sure why they were included since the main character was a traveler, not a cook. All in all, the book was a mixed bag. It held my interest, the characters were likeable, the mystery was not deep, complicated or surprising, and the love story was formulaic and would appeal to those who like their romances on the hot and sexy side.
