The letter contained a naive and optimistic list of goals that she wanted to accomplish by her thirtieth birthday. Looking at the list, Sarah realizes that she has only accomplished 2 of the original 8 goals, so she decides to realistically modify the list, and over the next twelve months change everything in her life, because she realizes that she isn't who she wants to be. As Sarah embarks on her year long journey of transformation, she is about to find out what true happiness and success are all about, and that over time goals don't always stay the same, and that her vision of a perfect life may not be so easy to accomplish.

In her debut novel, author Laura Kilmartin weaves an entertaining tale of one woman's year long journey of transforming her life into one that she perceives as perfection. Written in the first person narrative and set in Portland, Maine, the reader follows Sarah's journey on a month by month basis, with various encounters that come her way as she tries to complete each goal on her list. Everyone can relate to Sarah's vision, ideals and list of goals that she wanted to accomplish. I think everyone at one time or another has visions of what they want their life to be like, and has goals that they want to accomplish. Sarah's journey is filled with laughter, tears, heartache and crazy situations that culminates in her coming to the realization that life has a funny way of changing a person's vision of the perfect life, of what really matters most in life, and what true happiness is really all about.

Laura Kilmartin's, *Next Year I'll Be Perfect*, is a hilarious, fast-paced novel that fits nicely into the Chick Lit genre. This all changes on the night of Sarah's fun and carefree 29th birthday party. Sarah's happiness is drastically altered when Livvie presents to her a list Sarah made when she turned 25. Included in the list were goals that she hoped to have accomplished by the age of 30. Reading the list, Sarah realizes that not much had changed in the 5 years that had passed (except for getting rid of her cheating boyfriend.) Looking over the list, Sarah decides she has 1 year to accomplish the goals she made for herself. What happens next is a funny story following the sarcastic and sometimes bad-tempered Sarah as she tries to accomplish her goals. To make her

list more easily attainable, Sarah decides that she will probably not be able to reach her goal of sleeping with George Clooney, so she reluctantly marks it off her list.

I absolutely loved the back story that Kilmartin created for Sarah. Sarah's father is best friends with his partner on the police force, Jeremy. Unfortunately, one evening Sarah's mother and Jeremy's wife are killed in a car accident. The two men, not knowing what else to do, decide to raise their children in a pieced together family. Jeremy's sons, David and Eddie, are like the brother's Sarah never had.

From my own personal experience I can say that 30 definitely sneaks up on you. Yesterday it seemed like I was 21, today 30. When I turned 29 I immediately began to grieve for my twenties, even with a year left. I didn't think about the 365 awesome days I had left being twenty-something. Instead, I felt the clock and calendar ticking towards the horrible June day when I would officially be OLD. I feel that Sarah felt this way as well and handled her last year in her twenties much the same. Instead of focusing on making 29 a GREAT year, she was intent on having the perfect life by the age of 30. As long as she was checking off items on her list, she was on track. However, by the time Sarah reached age 30, she realized the goals on her list didn't make her successful or happy.

Sarah Bennett doesn't write a bucket list, but a list of what her life should look like by the time she turns thirty. Four years earlier when she wrote this list, it all seemed very reasonable. So when her best friend Olivia DiMarco (Livvie) reminds her of it on her 29th birthday, she is disappointed to find how little she has accomplished to get there. Written in Sarah's voice, Laura Kilmartin lets us experience the tailspin this list creates for Sarah in a great coming-into-your-own story.

The concept in this book is very relatable. I have set many goals for myself (and yes, they go beyond the silly list items of getting groceries, cleaning toilets, yada yada ?). The goals Sarah created four years before are those we all strive to achieve in a lifetime. She has a relationship goal, a career goal, a goal about certain things she wants to experience, etc. Unfortunately for Sarah, she has a long way to go to meet these goals in one year.

I loved Laura Kilmartin's pacing of the book and how it took me month by month through Sarah's journey. It doesn't take long for Sarah to realize that certain items on her list need to be tweaked a bit so she can start slowly but surely crossing things off. She prioritizes, then reprioritizes (sound familiar to anyone—it sure does to me), but to no avail. Her friends and family support her as she tries to accomplish these goals, and it is these interactions I found most endearing about this book.

Sarah was partially raised by her father's best friend, Jeremy, and was like a sister to his two boys, Eddie and David. They have a wonderful relationship, the kind where they can show up at any moment, even if it is mealtime, and join whatever they interrupted without feeling like an interruption at all. Jeremy's family gives her such strength. They are her go-to group when she is struggling and I enjoyed what they brought to the story, especially as I wondered many times if the relationship goal on Sarah's list could be checked off with David!

Livvie's contributions to the book were also very important. She is a true friend to Sarah. Their interactions are heartfelt at times and laugh out loud funny at others. Livvie is the sounding board for Sarah and gives her many reality checks month by month as she works on her list. Everyone needs a Livvie to spice up their life; she gets Sarah to do a drive-thru dating experience, which was one of my favorite scenes! Because she knows how important it is to her friend to accomplish these goals, Livvie helps her in so many ways, sometimes even going with the tough love approach to get Sarah to evaluate her true goals in life.

The other important characters in the book are Frank and Morgan. Frank, the sole owner of the law firm where Sarah works, is a complete jerk. Even so, Frank and Sarah have a way of working well together. Morgan is the annoying intern that is always trying to one-up Sarah. He has a lot going for him in life except that Sarah hates his guts. I loved how each of the relationships Sarah has with these characters changes somehow during the story.

As you can tell, I enjoyed many aspects of this book, but the one issue that kept nagging at me was how much this list took over Sarah's life. Granted, she only has a year to accomplish all these huge goals, but she lets it change her. There are a few moments that I had a hard time even liking her character at all. Everyone could see right through her! She is too naïve and perhaps too stubborn to look beyond the list to determine what she really wants out of life. Thanks to the strong characters in the story, she returns to a likeable person. Livvie in particular helps provide some clarity for Sarah that leads to a wonderful resolution to this refreshing story about one's goals in life.

Nevermind becoming perfect. Laura Kilmartin’s “Next Year I’ll Be Perfect” is perfect in every way, from stem to stern. It’s the story of one talented young professional woman with a sympathetic past who embarks on a journey of self-exploration and self-actualization between her 29th and 30th birthdays after she finds a years’ old bucket list. Kilmartin’s own hometown of Portland, Maine makes a scenic and refreshingly different backdrop for this coming of thirty-something tale. Her viewpoint character Sarah Bennett, who’s a little bit blue collar and a little bit white collar, is surrounded by a colorful cast of characters—adopted “siblings,” philandering ex’es, starchy bosses, and true blue friends. Even the small-town diner Sarah co-owns with her late father’s best friend becomes a principal character by the end of the book, a place you wish you had in your hometown. Kilmartin is a masterful writer as well as storyteller. Her novel takes some unexpected turns—just when you think Kilmartin is going to zig, she zags, and she does all this with literary ease and grace, as if she was born to write fiction. I just hope there’s going to be a sequel (are you listening, Ms. Kilmartin?) or maybe a picturesque TV series featuring Portland’s favorite lady lawyer Sarah Bennett.

There were many reasons that I liked this book:

**Characters** - I tend to enjoy character driven novels and this definitely fit the bill. Sarah Bennet was so utterly likeable - a bit neurotic and humanly insecure, with a love of *Little House on the Prairie* and *Buffy the Vampire Slayer* and I loved her earnest determination to cross items off of her list no matter what. I just wanted to hug her so many times. I also wanted to shake her at one point when she took some horrible advice and in the process completely embarrassed herself!
