After I won The Shadow tech Goddess as part of Goodreads Giveaways & First Reads, Ren Garcia was kind enough to send me a copy of this and its continuation/sequel, Against the Druries. I really enjoyed The Shadow tech Goddess, so I was more than happy to read and review these books, too.

I read The Shadow tech Goddess shortly before and after surgery, but I found the story so easy to follow that I only missed a few details due to the anesthesia-and-painkiller-induced fog I was in. I love fantasy and sci-fi, but I often find some stories are almost impossible for me to read. Furthermore, as The Shadow tech Goddess is part of a series, I was worried I'd not be able to understand the characters relationships with one another. This wasn't the case at all, and I fell in love with the characters and their stories- Taara and A-Ram were my favourites.

Getting the chance to read these characters from the start was fantastic. I already knew the characters, but getting to see them meet for the first time was a joy. While they've matured come The Shadow tech Goddess, I can still see their youth now, looking back.

The importance of the HRN coat, the MARZABLEs, Holystones and NTH all make sense now. I knew they were important on some level, but getting to read about how Belmont came to own these items and learn to wield them was good. It was a little unusual to have a 180-page back story in the middle of a 280-page novel, and I think this could have been laid out a little better, but on the other hand, it didn't particularly detract from the story at hand. Knowing this book leads directly into Against the Druries makes it easier to understand, and reading some of the reviews, I think this may be where people struggled. The book *does* end at an unusual spot for a standalone novel.

Normally I would keep another book in the series at close hand when reading part of a saga (it's a habit- I love to cross reference), but as I recently moved, my copy of Shadow tech Goddess is... *somewhere*. So that did detract my usual cross referencing joy, but I'm not willingly to swim in a pile of cardboard boxes and books and risk getting nipped by a spider.

Again, I really love the illustrations. There weren't as many in this as there were in the later book. I really liked the detail, though, and as I'm a little obsessed with reading comic books/graphic novels at the moment (I may have bought seven the other day... and I'm still reading Runaways and I'm in the middle of Black Hole in addition), this did get a kick out of me.

I'll be hitting up Against the Druries shortly, and with much enthusiasm.

I don't think Ren Garcia will ever write anything I don't like. I'm a big fan. But I felt like he was toying with me a little with this book. The reader is provided with a great space fantasy adventure, with plenty of dead-ends for our heroes and seemingly impossible situations (at first). It is a fun, quirky, fast-paced tale with his typical larger-than-life heroic characters. And then...

Before I continue, I'll have to tell you, I have a very linear brain. I like stories, unless they involve time-travel, to follow a definitive path. Any criticism I have about the non-linear qualities of this story are no commentary on the quality of this book – it is a wonderful read – but rather on my peculiar preferences. I still loved this book, but it drove me crazy reading it.

The story jumps back to events preceding the front-end action, following Belmont (or Bel as his friends call him), our hero, right back to the time prior to his birth. His adventures are thrilling. He's a very sexy character with womanizing ways and a highly unusual family. Description of his household, his sisters, his encounters with demons and the ladies he interacts with are colourful and vividly detailed. The plot is just as intricate as his earlier novels and his world-building just as sublime.

As much as I liked this "reminiscing", the opening storyline niggled at the back of my brain, a constant distraction while I followed the rest of the book. I wanted to know what happened to the folks he had left in the lurch, to the point where I was practically chewing my nails down to the nubs out of the frustration of

having to wait.

It was worth the wait, but in the end I was left with enough loose ends that now I'm going to have to deal with more waiting for the next book. Nevertheless, I'd definitely recommend picking up this book, another addition to a fantastic series.

This book does a nice job intertwining the occult and scifi. It appears to be the fourth book in the League of Elder series. Bel Stenstrom is the protagonist whose life is wound back from his current ship difficulties to look at what events in his childhood have created the man as he stands.
