I like the main characters, but there isn't much nuance to the heroes or the villains. They're all noble, good folk or dastardly, evil, scheming blackguards.

Also, I'm getting annoyed with the "no I can't kill them in cold blood" attitude. Evil people who have murdered other people in cold blood *can* be killed. Really. Grow a pair. But I guess there's not much of a story if you go around killing people who can cause trouble 50 pages further in.

Also, I'm getting a bit tired of the repetition when it comes to the mechanics of shooting bows. I don't need to constantly be reminded of the hours Will practiced, have-bow stringing described, notching of arrows, pulling back of strings, sighting the target, etc. I think most people, even those who have never held a bow, are familiar with the basic steps.

A new story line begins in Book 5 of the Ranger's Apprentice Series, with Will taking the spotlight and new characters joining the story. What's fun about this particular installment is discovering who Will will trust as he becomes a spy to discover the truth about a Sorcerer who's plaguing the land of Macindaw. Book 5 is just as enjoyable as the previous books and takes it's time introducing new characters and setting up new plots.
