In exchange for an honest review, Rose shared an ARC of *Desires of a Baron* with me. I expected to really like this story and it exceeded my expectations. I have read all of the Regency novels that Rose has written, I have re-read a number of them. I am honestly a fan of her work. I always enjoy the humor that pops up in her stories. I also like that her heroes and heroines are individuals who are not cookie cutter characters. Rose is also very good at not repeating her characters. Giles is her third Regency hero who is socially awkward, but he is very different from her prior heroes who might be described as odd. Giles especially is odd, but very self aware. He keeps trying and works to make his world right for him. Lucy was a minor character we first met in *Liberty for Paul*, actually we really got to know her son Seth. She has substantial struggles, but tries to face them all with determination and is likely as surprised as the rest of her world to have a happily ever after happen to her. Seth was a very young boy when we first met him, he is older now and has grown into a very interesting young man. I enjoy the interaction and relationship building that occurs during the book. I loved how Giles and Lucy grow into themselves, as a couple and also as a blended family. People may shy away from the label "nice", but it fits here - a collection of nice characters who are each struggling with some difficulty and how they grow together. I don't really know what to make of this book. It wasn't terrible, but it wasn't good either. So basically, did I

like it? Meh.

Plot: Lucy is a fallen woman with an adorable son who is determined to find himself a father. When he sees a severely injured man in need of help, he runs off to find his mother so that she'll help him aaaaaanddd...maybe set them up. The injured man's name is Simon and when he's well enough to leave, he sends for his brother Giles, Lord Norcourt. There is a weird dynamic between Simon and Giles because of questionable parentage but that gets into spoiler territory. Basically, the entire book is a giant love triangle between the three of them although we are supposed to be rooting for Giles, which I was. Giles was born with his cord around his neck and was, therefore, a little....different. It mostly manifested itself as social ineptitude and very literal thinking.

I can't decide whether this book should have been shorter or much longer, I'm leaning towards longer. In many ways, it read like a novella. We only ever really scratched the surface of any of the characters. We learn a lot about Giles but not nearly as much as I would have liked. We know that because he struggled when he was a child, he was sent away to a convent in Ireland. This is, of course, why he lacks any real social skills. He doesn't know how to talk to people and his way of thinking was shaped by horribly strict and cruel nuns. I had no problem with Giles, I thought he was a wonderful hero, he treated Lucy far better than most heroes of HR do, but something was missing. I think with a hero (or any character) that finds it difficult to connect with people, great care has to be taken so the reader doesn't have a problem connecting to that character. Does that make sense? I hope so.

I think the major thing that was missing here was actual romance. I found the sex a little odd and perfunctory and there really wasn't much chemistry between Lucy and Giles. It was lovely, don't get me wrong, but I had no sighing or fluttering or even the obligatory *awww*. It was more of a "Now isn't that sweet", which to me, isn't enough. I don't wish I had my time back or anything, but it really isn't anything I'd recommend.

Giles Goddard, Lord Northcut, is an odd man. He's simple and not very fussy. When he accidentally falls for his brother's latest love interest, he knows he is in trouble. But with so many obstacles between them, can they overcome them?

Desires of a Baron by Rose Gordon and is the second book in the Gentlemen of Honour series.

This is the story of Lucy Whittaker, an unmarried mother of a young lad, Seth, who wants to help his mother find a husband. When he tells his mother that an injured man seriously needs her help she doesn't immediately believe him because he's often lied in order to get her to meet a man he would like her to marry. She realises she can't just assume Seth isn't telling the truth and she follows him to where the man is supposed to be, and indeed where he is. Yes he is injured, badly. She and Seth drag, walk him back to their cabin where Lucy tends to his wounds. When he is conscious enough Simon tells her to send for his brother. He is quite enjoying Lucy's ministrations and as he isn't close to his brother, he doesn't think he will come to get him.

Giles Goddard, Lord Norcourt is the brother in question. He is actually Simon's half brother and for reasons that will become clear when you read the book, Giles was sent away when he was just a boy and was brought up in an orphanage. It's only recently that he and Simon have been in contact with each other, and the relationship isn't a very good one. Giles isn't as astute as some, he has problems with communicating sometimes, and he has very little self confidence. When he was born the umbilical cord was wrapped around his neck, and the belief is that that is what caused his problems.

When Giles fetches Simon, yes, he is a nice guy and does fetch him, there is an instant attraction between

him and Lucy. Unfortunately she has been hurt by a member of the aristocracy before and although she fancies Giles, she doesn't want to ever become involved with him because of his title. Simon is the son of a commoner, and he makes it known that he is keen on Lucy, he's a charmer, but is much younger than her. Seth has taken a real shine to him though and keeps putting his mother in situations where she has to spend time with him. Unknown to her though is that when she is with Simon, Seth is spending time with Giles and they are becoming firm friends.

An incident happens with Seth and Lucy that leads to Giles rescuing them and Lucy realises that she is falling for Giles. She doesn't know if she can trust him because of what happened in the past, but she has a feeling that Giles isn't like any other aristocrat she has known. He doesn't want to come between her and his brother, but he doesn't realise that it's Seth that has made more of a romance between Simon and her than there actually is. Will Lucy be able to make Giles see that she is interested in him, and not his brother?

Apart from the love triangle aspect of the story there is also some intrigue going on regarding Giles and his late father's will. He isn't very clever when it comes to the huge amount of legal jargon in the documents, and he accepts his mother's husband's help to sort things out.

On the whole I did like this book, but I didn't find it exciting, there was nothing to hook me into wanting to finish it, apart from the fact that I am reviewing it. It was a pleasant read, and the characters are lovely, especially Giles. I personally like a story with a lot more going on.

I read this story as part of an anthology, *The Hero Least Likely*, which I was given a complimentary copy of in return for my honest review.

And I thought the first novel in this series (*Secrets of a Viscount*) was good. *Desires of a Baron* was everything the first novel was - and more!

Following the same timeline as the first novel (this one picks up after Simon and Sebastian leave the house party), *Desires of a Baron* is filled with action, heartache, raw emotion and choices.

That isn't to say this novel was without humor, oh no! I would have to say that two of my absolute favorite moments are the custard eating contest between Giles, Simon, Seth and Mr. Appleton, followed closely by the scene in which Seth explains to Giles why he is not allowed to paint anything even remotely resembling a cactus.

Another thing that really stuck out to me was the fact that when I first began reading, I was excited to see Paul Grimes mentioned (for those of you who haven't read Rose's other works, he was the main character in her novel *Liberty for Paul*), and then I was even more excited to realize that Seth and Lucy were both also first mentioned in that novel. That is one of the things I love about Rose, her ability to engage you in one story, and then months (or even years) later she can write a completely different story about characters that appeared in one novel, and give them their own story in a completely new one. It makes the entire experience feel more like you're living it, instead of just reading about it. I mean how often do you read a novel where you see a name and think, "Oh! I know him. He married so and so, or he was involved in this scandal?" Just

another thing that (in my opinion) sets Rose apart from the rest of the pack.

I do hope there will be more to Giles' story down the road, I would love to know what happens to him as he tries to reclaim his Barony (so that he would hold more than just the title).
