Tarantino himself writes the introduction to this story and claims it's the first draft of the screenplay. It includes scenes that were deleted from the movie. Its rugged art style portrays the main characters distinctly from their movie counterparts. After reading it, I got the urge to watch the movie again. I hope I'll find the

time for it.

The action takes place in the Wild West, before slavery was abolished, where black men and women have no rights. Dr. King Schultz is a successful bounty hunter who uses somewhat unorthodox but effective methods in his trade. The first mission will be followed by many more that will strengthen the bond between him and Django. Schultz is motivated by money, but the younger Django wants to reunite with his wife.
