This was my favorite book of the series so far. Glory's whole outlook on life of taking what you have and being happy with it was contagious. Living with an old hermit who found her after being dropped by a passing wagon has left her without the worldly knowledge of common tasks, cooking, cleaning, sewing, reading and writing, but has also left her with a pureness when it comes to trusting people at face value and not being so exposed to the roughness of the world. This is refreshing! She meets up with a wagon master, Jackson who is bringing 5 mail order brides to Colorado. She joins in with them after some convincing and some stubbornness for not wanting to bring her problems of a revengeful uncle on these caring people, but can't help but accept their kindness.

They work together to educate glory on the simple tasks of life and little by little she becomes knowledgeable. She also learns of jealousy and she finds herself drawn to the patient, yet strict Jackson. She tells him of her past and he helps her to find that she has value as a person and that anyone would be lucky to have her as a partner...him included. She shows her worth and her feelings to Jackson when he comes to her rescue when her Uncle Amos finds and kidnaps her. Jackson risks him life to save her and then she ends up saving him with her rough knowledge and survival skills.

On their journey the meet up with a US marshal, Dylan McCall and Ruth one of the Mail order brides finds that she rather likes him, although her actions would say differently. Dylan promises to return after spring. Patience, Lilly, Harper, Mary, and Ruth decide to stay in Colorado at the towns acceptance after their mail order bride journey becomes discovered as a hoax and is a cover for labor workers in a mine.

I thought this was a very good story! Glory didn't act TOO impulsive as some of Lori Copeland's characters have. I liked the characters, though the author failed to describe more than one or two. Ms Copeland also tends to stretch out her books by repeating the same character's thoughts several times. This is a Christian historical romance, though not much history of the 1870s was revealed. Ms Copeland also tends to write every Prayer, word for word, it seems.. This book wasn't as bad on the wordy prayers as the book "Ruth". If you like Brides of the West theme, & Christian romances, then I recommend this book. It is the 1st of a 3 book series, & is to be followed by "Ruth" & "Patience". It will stand alone, though, if you're unable to read all three.

Author made horrible errors in her description of the geography of Denver. Much of the book hinged on getting to Denver before the pass closed from the snow. But they were coming from Missouri. No mountains to cross! Author described the twisting narrow mountain roads on approach to the city. I had a really hard time continuing to read with these errors. But I finished it. Nothing special. An easy read if you don't mind the problems with accuracy.

Glory was my favorite so far out of this series. I think Copeland finally got to a deeper depth of writing, and it showed through her likable characters of Jackson and Glory. They are quite wonderful, and the plot was also very good. The only problem I could find is the ending, where Copeland seems to lose interest in the story of Glory in order to introduce the story of Dylan and Ruth, which will be continued in the next installment. She sort of leaves you without enough details, and the resolution, although sweet and romantic, could have been better described. I know I read these semi-out of order, skipping Hope. Fortunately, although Hope does have a run-in with Glory in the book, there wasn't anything revealed *other* than that she got a particular guy.

Glory was a sympathetic book. Although Glory was a foundling (her Poppy found her by the side of the road when she was little), her Poppy taught her everything he knew about living in the wilderness. Including the

fact that baths are to be taken once in the spring, and on special occasions. Her Poppy knew he was dying, so he tried to get others to take Glory as their wife, three times, and she came back each time, for manly pride, I'm thinking. But on that last time, she found Poppy dead. She buried Poppy, and took a bath (as that special occasion).

It is unclear how long after Poppy died that his brother came - looking for trouble. Glory escaped him, but her mule died and she hooked up with a wagonful of mail-order brides bound for Denver City, Colorado lead by Jackson Lincoln Montgomery. Through various trials and tribulations, and she does drive a man's pride down when she shoots better than he does, can clean animals faster and do everything except cook, clean, and know when she stinks.

She is pursued by her Poppy's brother and all the girls are disappointed when, instead of their intended husbands, the person who placed the ad wanted "free workers" for his mine.

It is a very interesting story, especially since Glory can neither read, nor write. So on their travels the girls (Mary, Ruth, Patience, Harper and Lilly) teach her how to read, write, manners, deportment, and how to behave in society/public - after all, at the beginning of the book she had never worn a dress!
