I am not liking this book, and have no plans to finish it. I checked it out of the library because it had a cute cover and it sounded like a cute fairy-tale-like story with ghosts and magic wands. You know -- fun! This story is not like that, and from the reviews of people who started the series on Book 1 (I didn't know it was a

series until I'd started reading it), this is the least favorite so far.

This is a story that takes place in the South amongst a community of wiccans and voodoo (or vudu) practitioners, using magic potions and spells and influencing the lives of her customers by selling them teas and cookies infused with magic potions and spells to help them with their lives.

Then you throw in a dead body and a murder mystery gets added to the mix.

And even though this is fiction, it's not based on some fantasy, make-believe kind of magic, this is the magic that is being practiced by real people in real places. And this makes me uncomfortable. I felt like I was being taught how to be a witch, that I was being carefully led down the path to belief and conversion. It was dark and disturbing. So I stopped reading.

I was listening to the audio version of this book, and the reader kind of was getting on my nerves, as well. At first, I thought she sounded a lot like Siri, reading in a voice that's a lot like the computerized narrative that used to be available on Kindle books. You get the words, but not a lot of inflection. It gets better later on, but by then I was not liking the story a whole lot, so I'm done.

I enjoy visiting Savannah, GA and stopping by to see Katie Lightfoot and her Aunt Lucy at the Honeybee Bakery where put a little "magic" into their baked goods.

Honeybee's has closed for the day, but Katie and Aunt Lucy are still there as they are having one of their frequent spellbook club meetings. Then there is a desperate knocking on the door. The young lady knocking says she needs to talk to Katie. After learning she is talking to Katie she says that her uncle has sent her and that the gris gris, a voodoo talisman of power is missing and only a priestess queen can help. She becomes unconscious before she can give Katie a clue as to who she is or who the priestess is. Katie finds the girl's purse and learns that her uncle is the police detective Frank Taite. Shortly after the EMS personnel leave to take her to the hospital, Detective Quinn stops by to let Katie know that the body of Frank Taite has been found in an old abandoned building.

Katie asks for the help of the members of the spellbook club to use their different expertise in finding the priestess queen so they can have some idea who has the gris gris and where it might be before this person uses it to do more evil doings.

All the main characters from the other books, along with their familiars. They are enjoyable and very believable people that you would like to have as friends.

The best one of the group, by far. Although still a bit weighed down by cozy cliches in dialogue (such as profanity euphemisms that come across a bit silly at times), the story is juicy since it ties into voodoo, curses, hidden voodoo queens of the city, a certain detective's secretive past, and Katie finding out more about her personal power.

All regular characters have returned with enough page time to make me happy - we get Steve again (still have a hang-up for him even though Declan is sweet) - and he has a twisted side-story of his own involved. Declan fans will be happy to get bonding moments and a new revelation about him, and really Steve's love triangle possibility isn't strong since it seems more of a wrap-up against them to me.

We get plenty of time with the spellclub as well, even a new budding member, and a few more details for the backstory of Cookie's family. Quinn gets in on some of the secrets, and even the other familiars get page time. This one won with its cast of characters compared to the first four books, which made the book much more enjoyable.

I think the mystery part of this worked better than previously because it took some daring exploration into darker elements of magic and didn't keep everything so pure. Running into a powerful voodoo queen and having to flee her helped too, because frankly Katie sometimes has come across too purely powerful from the onset especially considering she is newer to her craft. It's good to have strong opponents for a change and not have the main character seem so highly above others in her league.

Despite the mystery being interesting, I wasn't surprised at the ending villain (there weren't that many people in the pot of suspects to pick from after all), but I didn't know the villain would be double and connected with someone who did kind of surprise me.

Throwing in some angst and trouble in Cookie's relationship added a more realistic dimension. It can get boring if the other club members have perfect lives with too easy to resolve issues. Throwing in a kink in the plans and struggle in a relationship makes more sense than everything being a bed of roses for them all the time.

It was hard to put down and ended with a nice bang. Will definitely be seeking out the sixth book soon.

The Spell book Club is having a meeting in the Honeybee Bakery when a young woman bangs on the glass looking for Katie. As she collapses, she begs Katie to find the "*gris-gris*". Katie learns that the woman is the niece of her friend Frank.in Taite and the mystery begins.

This installment of the Magical Bakery series is a little darker than previous books. The subject of voodoo has everyone on edge. Cookie is reluctant to get involved because of her family's past with voodoo, but soon realizes she may be the one to help.

A new woman in Steve's life has Katie curious and concerned. Although Katie and Declan are together she still worries about Steve.

The information about voodoo was well presented and added greatly to the spookiness of Savannah's haunted image. The various voodoo queens were well rounded characters. The "false" practitioners were creepy and upheld all the dark qualities of the religion.

I was saddened by the police findings early in the book as it does not allow Katie to have a sense of closure. She still has so much to learn about being a lightwitch.

I enjoy seeing Katie and Declan together. His new found powers add to the storyline and I can't wait to see where it goes.

This was a most enjoyable read. The description of the bakery goods always makes me drool. I was quite happy to find the recipe for macaroons in the book. They are a must do.

When a strange woman shows up at the Honeybee after hours looking for Katie claiming her uncle sent her and then collapses, Katie is perplexed. When she discovers the woman is the niece of Franklin Tate, Katie feels it's up to her to help. She goes searching for answers as to what happened to Taite, what exactly is a lightwitch and what is wrong with Ms. Taite. She discovers a dangerous voodoo practitioner has it out for the Taites and for Katie. It's going to take the whole spellbook club to get to the bottom of this mystery.

I really liked the mystery except that at the end, the magic element of the story ruins the suspense that comes in a normal mystery. I also wasn't entirely surprised at the reveal. I was partly surprised and partly not. I did like learning about voodoo and the different types and being introduced to new and fun secondary characters. I liked the romance aspect now that Katie has settled on Declan and now the angst has stopped. The romance is very sweet- and clean though Declan does spend the night at Katie's. It's only mentioned that he's snoring beside her but if that bothers you, don't read the book because it is a key scene in the story. There's some cute humor to balance out the dark mystery. I also enjoyed learning about different herbs and their non-magical but beneficial uses. I didn't like the Cookie-Oscar drama plot. It padded the story too much. I also didn't like the Steve romance drama either.

If I describe the characters then it will spoil the mystery but I'll make it general. There are a couple of voodoo practitioners in the story. I liked meeting them and seeing how they helped the other characters come to an understanding about their own gifts and in Cookie's case, her past. The ladies of the coven are very

kind and caring towards Katie and their love shows in this book more than in the past. I'm still indifferent towards Katie. I am on board with the hedgewitch thing but the lightwitch thing I don't get or find interesting. The new employee, Iris, seems like a fun character and I hope she plays a larger role in the next book.
