What an exceptional tagline that immediately made me want to pick up this novel, *New Wings* by author Donna Stanley. Ever since my first experience with spiritual warfare novels involving angels and demons living among us in the unseen realm through Frank Peretti's amazing *Darkness* novels, I've been searching for more just like it. Thankfully Donna has come through for me in this latest endeavor of hers. This is definitely a novel geared for young adults but I found such wisdom between the pages I just had to share my thoughts on this novel.

The story takes us into the heart of Olivia Stanton who has always wanted to see her guardian angel. She prays for it and soon God takes her up on the challenge. Her angel Mike appears to her as a teen driving a red Camaro watching her in the high school parking lot. Not really sure who he is at the time, Olivia gets spooked one day driving home and tries to lose Mike as he follows her in his car. When she runs out of gas, Mike offers to get her some gas and sends her on her way. Over the next few days, Olivia soon learns that Mike is her guardian angel and is sent to help prepare her for the spiritual needs of her high school friends. She meets Mike in her dreams who shows her that a close friend is cutting and if she doesn't intervene, she will commit suicide. It is then that Olivia begins to see how God can use her prayers and praise to impact the spiritual world in powerful ways.

Slowly she begins to see how people around her are being influenced and manipulated by demons as well as angels and just what she can do as a prayer warrior for Jesus who can see into the spiritual realm. But even Olivia isn't perfect and finds herself falling under the temptation of finding a boy who will love her and fails to pray about it first. She soon finds herself in a bad situation with a boy who wants nothing to do with falling in love with Olivia and is merely a player. Soon she learns that not everything she faces will be easy and that each day is an opportunity to draw closer to God and that the most powerful weapon a believer possesses is their ability to pray.

I received the novel, *New Wings* by Donna Stanley compliments of Glass Roads Public Relations and Creation House for my honest review and received no monetary compensation for a favorable one. In light of all the teens paranormal novels inundating the book market, I am relieved to see a breath of fresh air in Donna's novel. It does not imply a worship of angels and instead shows teens how their prayers impact the spiritual world we can't always see. In one situation, Olivia's friend Christina asks her to volunteer at a homeless shelter and Olivia is repulsed and afraid based on a situation she encountered when she was younger, but Mike encourages her to go anyway. In the end, Olivia sees the power of what her actions can do to bless the lives of the people she meets at the homeless shelter serving lunch and God gives her the opportunity to see them through His eyes. This is such a must read novel for any one who loves novels on spiritual warfare. I rate this one a 5 out of 5 stars and will be adding this one to my permanent library. I only hope that Donna continues to writing more in this genre. I think the impact will be life changing. I know just reading this novel has already changed my own prayer life.

Before I get into the book itself I have to say that I love this cover. Something about it is so soothing to me. It's so simple and yet the images that it invokes in my brain are very comforting. Why a wing has such strong emotions attached to it I'm not really sure but they're there. So needless to say that even before I started reading this one I was already in love with it. I also love the quote that's on the cover and in the book description. I think that one of the biggest failings we have with religion is that we're not fully ready to accept what can be accomplished through faith. So when our prayers are answered we figure there has to be a different reason. Most people find it hard to believe that someone is truly listening to their prayers - large and small.

Olivia has been chosen to receive a gift. She can see angels - and demons and spirits. I think she handles her new abilities very well. I know that if I were in her shoes I would be much more freaked out about things for much longer than she seems to be freaked out by it. But maybe that's part of the reason why she was given this gift - she was ready for handling it responsibly. As the story progresses and Olivia starts to use the power of prayer more often I started to relate to her a lot better. Even though I'm not a traditional "religious" person I pray regularly for all sorts of things big and small. It seems that at the beginning of the story Olivia only prays for the big things. Her realization that getting help with the small stuff is also an acceptable use of prayer is kind of refreshing for me. I think for many people prayer is seen as what you do when someone is sick, or someone is hurt, or something else big. Praying for someone to find the right words to say to someone who has been hurting isn't really something most people pray about. So out of everything about Olivia I think that realization is my favorite part of her spiritual change. I do have to admit that I didn't get a full image of who her friends and family were. Mike on the other hand is pretty well rounded. I had a good idea of what his reactions to certain situations would be, and I understood why he did the things he did - outside of protecting his charge, Olivia.

The premise of the story is great - being able to see the constant battle that is ensuing between good and evil. I think it was fairly well executed. My only issue with the story is that some things were just a little to convenient. I know that to keep the story from becoming War and Peace certain liberties have to be taken. There were just a couple of occasions where things almost felt out of place in the story because they were so obvious what was going to happen. Outside of those couple instances I can say that I really enjoyed reading this. It helped to reaffirm some of my beliefs about our lives and how we interact with the spiritual realm - or more so what kinds of affect we can have on the spiritual realm. Some of the topics dealt with are a little difficult to read about so I would have to say this is a book for older teens 15 and up. But I think that anyone who's struggling to understand our part in the battle between good vs. evil should read it. Young adults who are just starting to truly look at their faith and beliefs could also benefit from reading this one.

I enjoyed the concept of this book more than the actual book. The possibility of a visible spiritual realm here on earth, where angels can be seen battling demons in the name of Jesus is fascinating. However, there were many inconsistency in the writing which were hard to ignore.

In the beginning of the book we meet Tessa, Olivia's niece, and find out that Olivia has a much older sister. A few chapters later, Olivia refers to herself as an only child, and the niece she supposedly babysits every week, isn't heard of again until near the end of the book. There was also some confusion regarding how old the author wanted Tessa to be. She is described as 3 years old, early in the book, but later, Olivia refers to her "toothless grin," as though she were a 6 year old losing teeth. 3 year old children typically have all of their

baby teeth.

There were many other instances of small, but also very noticeable oversights on the author's part, from Olivia claiming to have never owned her own Bible as a child, to then stating she had her own King James version, or the scene where her mother cooks the food for her Eden's date night, and Olivia takes it over, presumably just to reheat it and serve it, yet the chapter details how Olivia cooks the shells and everything (which we were told her mother already did) while talking with Mike.

The story was interesting, and the spiritual gifts surrounding the main topic of events is thought provoking, but it seemed to lack an overarching plot, causing it to be very anticlimactic.

This review contains spoilers, but I feel that it should be read publicly anyway.

While I appreciate that this was a gifted book, I feel the need to provide an honest review.

I admit that I was slightly disappointed by the end of the book. It started off well with good character introduction and conceptual set up, but from there I encountered problems with how easy Olivia had everything. I understand (I believe) Mrs Stanley's plot basis where faith in the Lord and the power of prayer can fix any problems and, as a practising Christian myself, I can wholeheartedly get behind it. But there was little to no tension in the entire book, since she had her guardian angel effectively right behind her at all times. Where the existence of guardian angels isn't a matter that's really pertinent to this review, she and her friends effectively never encounter difficulties that aren't fixed within a page. To wit, at the point where

Olivia's father was being choked by a demon, she prayed and Mike (her Angel) came to vanquish said demon. Where I can sympathize with the need to assure the reader that all was well, it would have been a much more moving moment had her father needed to be hospitalized for a week or even overnight, instead of him being back to his normal self the instant he got his breath back. Additionally, when Greg and his friend were killed in a car accident, the whole plot point of their existence fizzled out when it was determined that Greg went to Heaven and Olivia had had no way of stopping his friend from going to Hell. It had been made fairly plain that Greg had become something of a love interest to Christina by that point, but from the end of that chapter on, he's completely out of the picture. They don't mention him or think about him or agonize over his loss as a normal teenager would. In fact, Christina is fairly blasé about the entire thing after the funeral.

To close, and not to inspire a faith based debate, my biggest difficulty arose from the fact that all Olivia or Eden or Christina had to do to make the entire world full of roses for another few pages was to pray. Faith without works is dead, as is indicated in James 2:14-26, but it seems as though all that Olivia has to do to make the world a better place is to pray for it and the people in it. It generally takes much more than that. In most good books, there is tension and the need to grow through trials and, where there are a few trials that need to be lived through, they only exist for the briefest of periods with all of them fixed by the same method in the same way and that makes for a rather flat and lifeless plot.
