Blue Rose is the most recent book in the Flowering series, and runs roughly parallel to both Forget Me Not and Lily of the Valley. (So before Star of Bethlehem.)

In book 1 Lily's story was told, and in book 2 we heard from Jack, but Blue Rose tells Alana's story, about her past, her present, and her dealing with it. Revisiting events from her past (since she was 11) with her new Councillor, Melinda, Alana faces up to some things that she has tried to repress, and recognises the need to come clean about certain things, even the things that she has hidden from Jack all these years. But dealing with the past isn't always an easy past to go down, particularly for Alana.

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I had to think about when I wanted to write this review, that may sound silly but it was whether or not to leave time between reading and writing the review. Normally I don't leave a gap at all, but reading Blue Rose has left me quite emotional. In the end, I've decided to write it straight away, still feeling all the emotions that the book made me feel, I thought it would reflect better.

Now, the reason it has left me feeling so worked up. I won't go into detail because I don't really want to, and

because this is a book blog and you don't read my reviews to find out about my personal issues, but some of the issues that Alana has had to face in her life are scarily similar to some of the issues I have experienced myself. And the accuracy with which Daltry described some of the feelings associated with those issues were so realistic that it couldn't help but make me cry.

As you can probably tell, Blue Rose is different from the other Flowering books so far, though Lily and Jack both had their issues, they only really scratch the surface in comparison to those of Alana, making this book far more emotional and maybe even darker, than any of the previous ones. That's not to say that there aren't moments of happiness and more importantly, hope, because there are, and the whole book is fantastically written (as were the others).

There was also a different set up to this book, there were some chapters that focused solely on events from Alana's past (clearly marked) and they weren't in chronological order. That may sound strange, but in the present Alana has started to see Melinda, and it is as she tells her about her experiences that the reader learns of them too. It was kind of like getting to know someone in real life, you had the surface Alana in the previous books, but then Blue Rose has peeled back the layers until you get the real Alana underneath.

I'm worried I'm coming across too negative, because I don't feel negative about this book at all, it has left me emotionally raw I will admit, but there is no part of me that regrets reading it. In fact it is that raw emotion that made this book so enjoyable (well not enjoyable exactly but I can't really think of the right word!)

Finally, if you're still with me at this point, I think it should be mentioned that there are several issues dealt with in Blue Rose that some people may find particularly difficult to read about, including (but not just), depression, trust issues, abuse (both physical and sexual), and self harm.

Heed the warning in the description of this book. If you do not like to read about topics like rape, suicide, adultery, abuse, etc., this book is not for you. Alana has been through more than any girl should have in just shy of a decade. She developed faster than the other girls her age, which caused her to be ridiculed for being more grown up than the others her age. Unfortunately, she caught the eyes of adult men as early as eleven

years old. None acted on their desires until her father took advantage of her. She was so young that she didn't know it was wrong. This became a trend in her life. She was called derogatory names that really don't apply to a rape victim, but the other kids in school didn't know the difference. How any other them learned the truth, we will never know.

Alana makes friends with Jack and Dave who have some serious problems of their own. They are the outcasts at school, but their misfortunes bring them together. Their closeness also causes them not to move forward with their lives. They latch onto each other in an unhealthy way where they dwell on their problems. Except for Dave really. He has found a way to move forward, but his love for Alana remains. It's just a question of whether that love is a healthy kind or not and whether Alana can learn to accept it for what it is. These are all issues that Alana must deal with in therapy. She finally has a therapist she likes and is making progress.

The book alternates each chapter between what happened in her past and what is currently happening. It is a book about healing and that it can be a long, miserable road. Much like how Jack, Dave, and Alana being around each other causes them not to move past their problems, my depressing family death caused this book to be even more upsetting to me. Over the last twenty years, I've learned how to keep secrets. It doesn't really matter, since everyone already seems to think they know everything about me. So I hide. I avoid confrontation, I treat Xanax like a magic pill that will make it all go away, and I become everything they think I am. A slut. A whore. Nothing but trash.

I can only name two guys who have ever made me feel like I was more than that. Jack is my best friend and I've loved him since I met him. Now, though, he's in love... with someone else, and I guess I need to get over him. Somehow.

And then there's Dave. The guy I never gave a chance. The guy I used almost as much as people used me, because I wanted to pretend I was someone worth loving. Two years have passed since we last spoke, but I don't know how to stop thinking about him.

My new therapist is making me face my past, and she tells me that life inevitably changes without our permission. I believe it, but I know what I am. I hear what she's saying to me, and I want to try again with Dave, to help Jack find joy, to love myself, and to move on. I just wonder if anyone can do that, really.

I feel as if I need to preface this re view with a disclaimer. I am a very fortunate woman. As a child I have both parents that loved me, spent quality time with me, came to my volleyball games, recitals, took me to church. I had the sibling, the dog, the 2 story house. Now the other side of that coin is that my life wasn't a fairy tale. I am red headed. At the age of 12, red hair was definitely NOT my favorite. I was teased, sometimes very cruelly. I, however, had the strength and love of my family and close friends to not take that bullying and cruelty to heart. After reading this story I realize that I am a VERY lucky girl. Yes, this is a fictional book, but it covers some very intense and emotional issues. I had a hard time processing some of it. I wanted to cry for Alana. I wanted to curse the horrible people that shaped her life. How could they? WHY would they?!

Wait...I'm getting ahead of myself. You know what makes me do that....get ahead of myself? A good story.

Alana is beautiful. VERY beautiful. So beautiful that she sees that as a curse. Is has nothing but plagued her whole existence. Alana did not live through her childhood, she survived. Viciously abused by 2 separate men starting at the age 11, Alana wasn't given the opportunity to live. Now as an adult she looks back and relives her childhood and the mess she has made of it. She is now a hollow person, believing her purpose is to be the slut she has been labeled since before she knew what that term meant.

Alana depends on 3 things. Sex, Xanax and Jack....not the drink. Jack is her best friend, the only person she says she can "feel" with. The problem with Jack is that he is a problem and Alana can't take on more problems. But she does because she loves him. He was her first and her intermittent now. She needs him...or does she? Then there is Dave. He is also a friend from high school. She dated him after she and Jack broke up. Now he is off in the Army and she's lost touch.

She starts seeing a new therapist, who I want to KISS. ON. THE. LIPS! Alana begins to see this super chill therapist that talks with her, not just listen or pass judgment. She pushes Alana to accept her past as the past and look to change her future.

If you haven't gotten the gist yet, this is not the typical new age romance. This is a raw, gritty look at a young woman who had her world turned upside down and now she is trying to right it. Alana is an interesting person with a heartbreaking story and I was emotionally invested in seeing what happened to her.

#### Comments on the romance:

There is a romance, but it is not the main focus of the story. Instead, *Blue Rose* is about Alana's life as she sees it and her relationships with people, and in particular the four men who have impacted her the most. The romance happens only after Alana reaches a place in her emotional growth where it can happen, and readers who go into this novel expecting an immediate, clear-cut romance that is ever-present and predictable will not get that. Readers who want to know more about Alana and think the story sounds like a good one, on the other hand, may be well-rewarded.

#### Other comments:

The author pulls no punches here in how she deals with the subject of childhood sexual abuse (which comes up a lot in the story), and readers who would prefer not to read about that should know this book contains frank discussions of abuse and scenes which may be triggering to those who have experienced abuse of any kind. There were many scenes which made me mad, sad, uncomfortable, and a whole range of things.

Overall, I'd call *Blue Rose* an emotionally difficult but involving read. Once I picked it up, I couldn't stop reading for long and finished the novel quickly for its length.

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
