### **Story: 3/5**

The story is a good one; kids growing up together in a small town, discovering God, the opposite gender, and heartbreak, both romantic and otherwise. Though it's nothing really original, it still works.

### **Writing: 0.5/5**

Oh, my goodness; where do I start? First off, the book moves too fast; in less than 200 "pages"--of large print and with plenty of blank space, mind you--we're taken through the characters' childhoods, teenage years, and the beginning of their adult life. It felt like I was watching a DVD on a player with the fast forward button stuck. Not only that, but most of the characters and places were vaguely described. If they decided to make *Chop, Chop* into a movie--please don't, Hollywood!--it would be pretty much up to the producers as to the ethnicity, eye color, hair color, height, style of dress, etc., of the characters, because they get little mention. From what I hear, Victor Hugo's writings--which I haven't read! I know; what kind of avid reader am I?--are notorious for their long, detailed descriptions; well, this is the polar opposite of that. Seriously, this book is written like a elongated summary, a poor movie or TV novelization, or a middle schooler's account of what he or she did this past summer.

### **Content: 2.5/5**

If this weren't a Christian novel, it would be higher. Still, usage of profane phrases or words such as, "Oh, my G--!," "Good L---!," and "C--p!" were just too much. True, some of those usages are vilified...but not all of them. Talk about "think[ing] we're gay" muddles things ever further. Also of note: The "tragedy" mentioned in the synopsis involves violence that may hit too close to home for many readers, in light of recent events.

**Conclusion:** The self-publishing business may be good for some, but *Chop, Chop* is one of the biggest literary disappointments I have ever experienced. The end matter says that there are eight books in the series; seriously, how can this mess go on for even two or three novels? If you're looking for a well-written Christian drama, go find something by Karen Kingsbury; seriously, her novels are great, especially when compared to this garbage. I'm glad this one was free for the Kindle; I may have wasted my time and iPad battery power reading it, but at least I didn't pay for the book itself.

Not counting that whole bit about the climax ^^ the rest of the book was really, really, really good too. David, Greg, and Laci, BFFs forever, stick strong together through thick and thin. Through practical jokes about “chuffers” (imaginary creatures they were trying to convince Greg lived in the snow or mud and stole shiny objects) or coconut shampoo (long story), or going to mission trips to Mexico or vacation trips to Chicago or Florida—this book follows these three, through David’s perspective, from preschool (where David and Laci meet when they hide under a staircase and taste PlayDoh) to college.

Now, for the first like 5 paragraphs, I thought it was a girl talking. I have no idea why. Actually, I do. It’s probably because all the books I’ve ever read in 1st person except for Percy Jackson and Pendragon are from a girl’s perspectives. For some reason, I just haven’t found as many with boys. And I’ve *never* read a CHRISTIAN one. But David is a funny, smart narrator and he’s honest about everything (as he tells you he’s going to be from Chapter 1). And there are more books!! I am totally going to try and get my hands on one.

It’s a little surprising that he can “remember” everything. It’s all in past tense, and when he’s describing how he freaked out in preschool when Laci cut her nice, long hair, to donate it to Locks of Love, he says that he doesn’t remember it exactly, but he believes the story as his mom (and Laci) tell it. And they say that he freaked out. Even though it couldn’t actually happen, that somebody could write a story like that and remember EVERY SINGLE detail about their life in elementary, middle school, jr. high, high school, and then college, it’s still pretty cool. The book isn’t too long, and it skims through or skips over his life pretty quick. But not in a way that makes you feel too rushed, either. It stops to fondly remember funny activities or pranks they had in their past. Or sad or scary times.

But I don’t want to tell you every detail about this book. ‘Cause, if you are reading this, you should be already motivated by the positive vibe about this book that is pouring out of me, into these words, streaming out of the screen into your eyeballs, and you are now seized by a zombie-like control that forces you to locate the closest version of *Chop, Chop* and grab it and start reading.
