I bought this at the gift store in the Handel&Hendrix museum in London, and probably should have read up on it before the impulse purchase.

This is essentially an attempt at an unauthorized "autobiography" by editing together a bunch of interviews and letters into a book. It's pretty uneven, and the book's flow is a bit jagged. Hendrix interviews can be entertaining to watch or listen to, but his somewhat nonlinear train of thought don't entirely translate into biographical writing. Also, when you're mixing long-form interviews with quickly-jotted letters to fans and very brief one-sentence diary updates, it makes for a very lopsided read.

Also, the book's "photos" consist of either sketches or tracings of popular photos of Hendrix you've probably seen in other books. I'm not sure if this was done to add an artistic flair, or if the tracing was to get around rights issues.

The book has some information useful to completists, like the diary entries. There's also good reference on the sources used. Otherwise, it wasn't that interesting to me.

I felt like I had just been through the mind of a genius. I felt so much more empowered and so much more motivated as a musician after reading this book. definitely a must read for fans and musicians alike.

This book arranges interviews, letters (presumably full text) to family and fans, a letter to an album cover designer, and an attorney's letter to him into a chronology for Hendrix's life. The editors have short intros to each piece citing what was happening in Hendrix's life at the time.

There are a few photos. A layout has changing text sizes and shades of purple. The wonderful line drawings have a signature that does not match any attribution (probably a copyright holder and not the artist). Were the book to have a larger format, it would be considered a coffee table book.

In the narratives you see Jimi's concern for his father, his daring in leaving steady (for this industry) gigs to work on his own art, his positive attitude, his openness to all music and his overwhelming exhaustion. He speaks and writes a lot about music giving the reader a glimmer of what he might have produced had he lived.

If you didn't know how the story ended, you would not know from the text. There is very little about drugs. His writing is so tame that you are surprised when he wrecks a car in Honolulu.

Fans, hungry for anything Hendrix will most likely want to read this.

The authors claim the narratives are based on Hendrix's letters and words, but the lack of family sanction casts doubts on the authenticity. I was glad to read this; glad it exists, but wish for a better book.

This one is cobbled together from a mix of letters home, diary entries, interviews and song lyrics so it is not an autobiography in the true sense of the word. Still, what could have been a disjointed mess actually flows along quite nicely and by the end of it you really do get an idea of the man and his music. Admittedly I am too old and cynical to buy into a lot of the spiritual mumbo jumbo but it certainly would have hit home in the summer of love. This book would probably work well alongside a decent biography that tells the story from start to end but overall it is a nice experience.

Jimi just broke my heart, in passages like this:

"I think I'm a better guitarist than I ever was, but I have never been really good. Every year, like my writing, it slips further and further away. The music I might hear I can't get on the guitar."

On the other hand, I'm glad for him:

"I see miracles every day now...spirituality and things in the head, they're always there. I mean, it gets better and better all the time. I'm always having visions...It's out of what's directing me. What I was here in the first place to do."

And:

"Craziness is like heaven. Once you reach that point where you don't give a damn what everybody else is saying, you're going towards heaven."

I'm really glad I read *Starting at Zero*; I really knew so much less than I thought I did about Hendrix, his music (I really wasn't familiar with much other than the songs that got airplay, astonishing as they are), his life, and the circumstances of his passing. The book is comprised of nothing but his own words, with a few editorial notes tossed in here and there for context, so the reader is left on her own to draw conclusions about who Hendrix was and what happened to him.

My own conclusion is that he was a gentle, modest, brilliant man who gave the world his immeasurable gift and went on. And that he wasn't "crazy" in the least, unless you use his own definition of the word.

But the music industry must be one hell of a vicious machine.
