At the end of Don't Turn Around, Noa, Peter and Zeke narrowly escaped the evil Pike & Dolan corporation after uncovering their dangerous and unethical experiments on wayward teens. Though they would like to think they have stopped P&D, it soon becomes apparent that there may be other warehouses across the country, so Noa and Zeke set out to investigate/help other potential victims while Peter stays in Boston to feed them intel and help them stay ahead of the threat.

But P&D are more dangerous than any of the kids could have imagined. During a rescue mission gone awry in Phoenix, Noa and Zeke find themselves in deep trouble, and Peter finds himself even more immersed in P&D's evil deeds when he realizes Amanda, his ex-girlfriend, may have been infected with the virus.

No one can be trusted.

Everyone is in danger.

I LOVED the first book in this series, and really enjoyed this one as well. I love the action, the mystery and the thrills. Ms. Gagnon definitely knows how to build tension and craft explosive and heart-pounding action scenes.

While I felt the pace to this one was a bit uneven (the first half kind of dragged in places but the second half was way intense), and I did like the first installment more, this book is definitely worth a look. It's definitely a "filler" book, but I didn't feel it completely suffered from the dreaded "second book syndrome". There's a ton of information revealed and plenty of twists which perfectly sets up for what is sure to be an epic conclusion in book three.

I loved Noa in the first book and I loved her even more in this installment. I love her strength, her resourcefulness and her ability to adapt. She's strong, intense and determined.

I must admit, I was a bit disappointed in Peter in this installment. I think I liked it better when he and Noa were physically working together in the first book. Their relationship felt more cohesive. Peter seemed to be a bit off in this one, which makes sense because of his determination to help Amanda. Speaking of Amanda — I'm not really a fan. I just couldn't connect with her for some reason. I'm hoping maybe that connection finally happens once book three comes along.

This was a gripping second book in The Persephone Project trilogy. I eagerly await to see what happens in the conclusion. While the first book was all about Noa avoiding being caught and trying to figure out what they did to her before she woke up on that operating table and escaped the warehouse she had been kept in for close to a month, this one was about her finding the courage deep inside of herself to believe that they could once and for all take down Project Persephone. She has to find her footing with each raid they go on to find kids to save. Along with Noa's perspective, we also get glimpses of what's happening back in Boston while Noa is heading the Southwest Unit of the Persephone Army through Peter as he handles the hacking part of taking down the bad guys (*cough*Mason*cough*); we also get to see a lot more from Amanda's perspective than we did in the first book as she becomes ill and denies the obvious until the end of the novel; and the final perspective is of a new character that we're introduced to early on, Tao, that we are able to watch grow as a character from the point he joins Noa's unit up until the end.

Also, unlike book one, this novel had romance in it, but it is frustrating because the timing just is so off between Noa and Zeke throughout the whole novel until it's too late. I'm upset about Zeke still and I don't think I'll be able to get over his death. Seriously. I was rooting for Noa and him to end up together because the chemistry between them was written so well that you couldn't help but ship them together. That final Noa/Zeke scene was just heart-wrenching - You're trying to prepare yourself for Zeke's exit, yet you still want to see them happy and together. There's still a lot to love about this series, but I didn't quite enjoy the second one as much as the first. Don't Look Now like its predecessor, Don't Turn Around, is an action packed thriller that truly has some ultimate suspense moments.

Now to the other two characters driving the story... Peter and Amanda. Peter was awesome in the first one, and he still had some great moments in this one, but his whole impact to the story seemed noncommittal based on his location and impact to the greater cause. Then there's Amanda. I really really despise Amanda. I felt for a lot of the book she was whiny, stubborn, and a distraction to other more important things going on, including Peter.
