Finally I'm 1/4 through the series (I think). Considering I read volume one in September 2017 and it's not

What's it about?

Why it gets 5 stars:

The story continues to be interesting and intense. I love that because in some series, the story begins to not be as interesting after however many volumes, this one can still be awesome after at least ten so Miura is clearly doing something right!

The art gets better and better every volume! I know I keep saying it but Berserk has the best art I've ever seen in manga and I read quite a bit of manga!

The characters are very interesting. Added to the most interesting characters list for this series is Charlotte. Too often these royal characters are either not interesting or assholes but not Charlotte!

The action scenes are awesome. At first I thought this was going to be a volume that has a bit of action but not piles while still being interesting. While this isn't the most action packed volume there's still a lot of great action and one scene in particular... holy shit, it's amazing! I don't want to say too much but there's an action scene that takes place in a dungeon and it's probably the best (and goriest) scene in the series. It's so good that if I were to rank best action scenes in comics it would probably be somewhere in the top five!

This volume is pretty suspenseful. There are some parts that are fairly predictable but others that are unexpected and have me really wondering what's next for the series.

There's some horror stuff and it's so well done. Expect grotesque monsters and piles of gore in this volume!

The fight with the Bakiraka is one of my favorite action scenes in Berserk. I love seeing the band of the hawk work together and use their unique skills to survive. The fate of Griffith is a great shock and I love how that scene is handled. It's really effective to see how far Griffith has fallen. It makes the reader's relationship with Griffith feel just as complex and textured as the other characters' relationships with him. On one hand, he's manipulative, controlling, insecure, and uses Charlotte. But he still means so much to these people because they don't realize how nasty some of his actions have been. They see him as a charming leader who brought them all together for a higher purpose. The fact that he sees them as pawns whom he (pretends) not to have any emotional attachment to is lost on them. If they thought critically about it, they would realize how fucked up Griffith's description of the relationship is. And if Griffith took a minute to reflect on his

emotions, he would realize he isn't the cold, calculating, dream-following robot he likes to think he is.

But that's what makes Berserk so great. These people aren't acting stupid or irrational; they're just following their heart and trying to do their best. The nuance in their relationships and emotions is what establishes them as flawed humans, rather than gullible fools. It's only when the stakes are raised that the vileness of Griffith's worldviews become apparent. It was always there, from when he was willing to kill Guts for trying to leave, or how he tries to force his crippled body on Casca. But until those points, you could write off the more subtle hints that Griffith might be a monster.

And even knowing his inner thoughts, it's hard to hate Griffith before he throws himself on Casca in vol 12 or so. There's a charm to him, and he does lead an interesting life. He means a lot to these people. And they mean a lot to him. But he has convinced himself otherwise. The Golden Age revels in these emotional grey areas. Miura put it best when he said that in this story, emotions govern logic. And at this point, we're spiraling toward an ultimatum. Griffith has lost a lot because of his dishonesty about his feelings. Rather than realizing this, he's going to double down on the facade he's created.

However, I could do without the apostles showing up to attack the hawks that stayed behind. This feels more like jumping the gun than it does foreshadowing. And it makes the eclipse less shocking because we've already been exposed to similar imagery just before it.

Not sure how I feel about Casca being kind of wishy-washy either. I get that she's torn between Griffith and Guts, but I feel like her inner monologue about Guts from the previous book was pretty decisive. Maybe it was an attempt to show how her mind has reached that conclusion but her feelings don't want to move on from Griffith? If so, that didn't work for me and wasn't me read on the situation.

Here the seeming disparate threads start to weave, and Muira reconnects to the original Black swordsman arc. Griffith tortured and partially flayed and in prison deep in Windham Castle's catacombs, the king of Midland rotting with his kingdom and corrupting his own daughter. Supernatural elements beyond Skull Knight and Nosferatu Zou start to appear: Bakiraka and demonic and inhuman Wyald. Wyald's army whose are some of the most despicable knights in the Midland. Guts vaguely realizes that something is going wrong but compelled by friendship and love, he descends down to find Griffith, who has been forced to confront the darkest parts of himself as well.

Absolutely painful. Seeing Griffith in such a broken state made my chest hurt. The Hawks team up with Princess Charlotte in an underground retrieval mission only to find out that their savior Griffith is just barely clinging to life with dozens of permanent injuries such as surgically removed tendons and a cut out tongue.

Rickert's team was slaughtered by demons, young Rickert himself being the only one to make it out alive. I'm sure he's traumatized from witnessing so many of his friends die.

The retrieval mission was somewhat successful, but what hope do the hawks have now that their leader will never rise again? This was the most emotionally devastating volume so far.
