Sigfried's Smelly Socks! is an illustration book for children that focuses on describing the smell of dirty socks at its fullest. Whilst I have mixed feelings as to how disgusting this subject is, I quite liked the bright-coloured illustrations.

I strongly believe that children are meant to love this book - it is full of wittiness and it made me giggle a few times, when the author describes how different coloured socks smell differently, and all so awful.

This book has a tendency to make you imagine the smells in your mind while reading and watching the illustrations. It can even make you feel like you could actually smell them in the room. Lovely description, though some parts might be too hard to be understood by the younger audience:

But nothing compares to the other smell that burns the hairs on my head.

While we discuss the subject of how the book focuses on dirty socks and some people might find it unbearable - I would point to the fact that this book is a perfect masterpiece in reminding the little cute monsters that they need to keep their socks (and their hygiene in general) neat and clean. It is a great moral and life lesson through a very funny story told by the silly Sigfried, who seems to notice all the rotten smells that surround him.

At first I thought this book might be ok, although nothing special. Considering the fact that it's currently free for the Kindle version, and how the picture book crew can go through books, ok can be ok.

I certainly can appreciate the fun factor of a good gross out for children. I gave a book about a poop fountain a glowing review: The Qwipick Papers: Poop Fountain!. So, I'm not adverse to a bit of stinky, messy, fun.

But, I advise giving this one a skip. The text is nothing special, in fact I find it problematic in a couple ways - first, it lists a bunch of smelly, messy things that have been done to "this book":

"Perhaps it was the rotten banana that I left on the page right here." and "The yellow stain on this page is where my naughty dog Oscar PEED."

At an age where parents still may be working on teaching their children not to draw on the pages of a book, or rip the pages out, or various other book damaging things the very young can be prone to, I'm not sure this book is sending a good message.

At the end the book also shows a boy putting soap into a toilet to wash his dirty socks, and then the boy jumps in the toilet himself.

Again, not a message I think we want to be giving the target audience of picture books.

The art is an odd, and often unappealing, mix of drawing and photos of real objects.

Overall, even for free I say give this one a pass.

Sigfried Smelly Socks is a Children's Picture book that is written by Len Foley, and published by New Horizon Health, Inc. It is a very short picture story about stinky smells, that is written for very young children. Sigfried, the main character, talks to the reader through out the entire book about a lot of gross smells. This book is a funny, silly read that adults can enjoy reading it to their children and grandchildren. I really liked how the author dedicated this book to two children, Becky and Sofia, whose never ending pile of socks inspired her story.

First, I want to talk about the illustrations in this book. I loved the colors and creativity that went into creating these illustrations. The bright, vibrant colors used, and the real images added through out the pages, created what I would like to call " The perfect formula" for illustrations in children's books. The book was written and illustrated by the same person, Len Foley. This fact in its own, makes appreciate the work that went into making this book even more.

Second, I want to discuss the storyline. The main character, Sigfried, is talking to the reader throughout the entire book, which is something that i found to be very interesting. He takes you through the very same book that you are currently reading, and explains why it smells gross. From the rotten banana that he left on a page of this book, to his dog's pee, Sigfried takes you on a sensory rollercoaster. A rollercoaster of stinky smells and gross stains. Also, SOCKS! Lots and lots of patterned and colored socks, and each one has its own unique gross smell.

Here is what I liked about this picture book. It was a very funny, weird, stinky read. The Illustrations were very creative and colorful. I absolutely loved it. When the story rhymed, it was very entertaining & puny!

Finally but not least, here is what I didn't like. A rhyming book that doesn't rhythm half of the time. Also, parents would find it a bit problematic if their kids are already a bit naughty. Why? Because the kids might want to try out some of these things in real life, so I highly recommend that the parents read it alone before reading it for their kids. This is why I am giving this book 3 out 4 stars.
