They enjoyed it and we talked about going to the library to find books about the project you are getting ready to do, planting gardens, making scrapbooks and cooking from the garden. I thought that this would teach children to find books about topics that they love so that they can become an avid reader.

Lola Plants a Garden by Anna McQuinn and Rosalind Beardshaw is about a young girl named Lola, who is

inspired by a poem called “Mary Mary Quite Contrary” to plant a garden. An interest in gardening is sparked and Lola and her mother go to their local library to checkout books on how to plant a garden. After reading the “how to’s” and then planting the seeds in the ground, Lola has to wait for the plants to grow. In the meantime, Lola makes a flower book and other trinkets that she will show off to her friends once the flowers bloom. Lola shows off her new garden to her friends while they enjoy tasty treats from Lola’s mothers’ fruit and vegetable garden.

This book could be considered either an independent read or a read aloud book appropriate for grades K-2. This book will be incorporated into my classroom as both a independent read and read aloud for students. Students will be inspired to read a text (i.e. poem) and then conduct their own research in order to create a new masterpiece like Lola did in creating her garden.
