I always marvel at short stories that create a complete universe in so few words. It's hard to say if I loved this script so much as I had seem the play performed earlier in the year. Reading the words I was taken back to that evening at the Malthouse where I laughed and moments later bit the inside of my lip to stop myself from sobbing. Perhaps it was because there was an empty seat next to me where my husband was to sit. But he was home curled under the covers unable to make it outside the front door. Perhaps the play about depression and suicide was a little too raw for me that night.

But the script captures all the wonderful heartfelt beauty that the play evoked. I found the footnotes (describing details about alternatives and directions in the play - as it includes improvised moments with the audience) distracting and I thought it best to read them at a later date. A date when I didn't want to escape into the memory of that evening.
