Considering the audience this book is aimed at (men* who know nothing about clothes), it's fairly shallow and often unhelpfully vague. It's also hard to take seriously when different chapters contradict each other (e.g., on the question of who should wear pleated pants). One possible explanation is that the contradictory advice was written by different people---the book has an editor, not an author.

The "Bible" title implies something comprehensive and authoritative. The book is neither. I'd say it's not worth your time reading it, but it's so short that it doesn't take much time to get through.
