I liked this book, but it took me a little while to get into it. It takes place in the present, but we are given flashbacks to tell us the story of how Nate and Hayley became a couple. So the story jumps around and at first it wasn't very obvious when we were getting a flashback. I found it to be a bit confusing, but once I caught on to how the author was using the flashback plot device the book became easier to read.

"Good luck not regretting the stupid shit you've done."

Those are the last words Hayley says to Nate. They dated when they were in high school, but broke up when he enlisted into the Marines. It was a very bad break up and they haven't spoken to each other since. It's almost 4 years later and Hayley is now a freshman in college. She is trying she is making a life for herself, but has never really gotten over Nate. Hayley has a supportive roommate and a fantastic group of friend, but she becomes increasingly distracted by thoughts of him and it begins to affect her everyday life.

Meanwhile, Nate has never gotten over Hayley. He frequently thinks of her while he is deployed and even keeps a picture of the two of them with him at all times. After he gets hurt, starts to make videos asking Hayley to "come back to Texas." He starts them as something to do because he is in the hospital and is bored out of his mind. The videos become a kind of therapy for him and people start to watch them, like a lot of people. Nate also starts to get the people he knows and meets along the way to add in their two cents.

Here's the thing...while I really liked the videos Nate made for Hayley, I just wish she had seen them sooner. And if they were such a hit on YouTube and according to Hayley's roommate, Facebook, why didn't they come into play sooner. Hayley told her friends about Nate so they could have easily put two and two

together. Youths! Aren't they supposed to be good with this stuff? It just kind of felt like a lost opportunity, but they ultimately served their purpose, so i guess that is something.

I really liked Nate and Hayley as a couple. The way they meet is cute and it isn't long until they are spending almost all of their time together. Despite Nate being a few years old than Hayley, the two of them have a great connection and are super comfortable with each other. They have a wonderful relationship, until they don't. After Nate's grandmother passes away things deteriorate quite rapidly. This leads to Hayley saying the quote above, the aforementioned bad break up and Nate leaving for the Marines. Cut to the present and where the book starts.

I look forward to reading the companion novella to this one. I hope that Hayley and Nate are able to move forward and work out their issues. It's clear they still love each other and whether or not they will get back together will depend on a lot of things. They are both older and SO MUCH has happened while they were apart.

Nate and Hayley fell apart when he headed off to the military and then war, and while they've never really gotten past their feelings for each other, they've both moved on with their lives. She's off at college, making friends and music with her a capella group, and hiding away her residual love for Nate. Nate, on the other hand, is a world away, simply trying to survive in a war zone and hoping that one day he'll be deserving of the girl he left behind.

But... For a book billed as romance, there really wasn't much happening in that department. While Nate spends his time uploading videos about his feelings for Hayley, she's simply moving along with her life, completely unaware of his heart being bared online. In fact, aside from a few flashbacks, the two have zero communication and don't even speak directly to each other until the very end of the book.

The Verdict: If I'm being perfectly honest, I have to say I got bored. The writing was good, and the story was interesting, but instead of moving forward, it all seemed to grow stagnant. I've read plenty of good stories in which the two destined characters lived rather separate lives for a good part of the story, but never for 99% of it. Nate's video diaries, in which he professed his love for Hayley and begged her to come back to Texas were sweet, and I kept waiting for her to notice as they went viral. But she was completely oblivious, and her part of the story (which was the bulk of the book) was simply a telling of her day to day life after Nate, interspersed with little flashbacks of their high school romance. I was tempted to start skipping chapters in the hope of stumbling across the one where they finally reconnected.

Come Back to Texas is the story of a college student not over her high school boyfriend, and the soldier he became realizing he'd do just about anything to have her back, but in many ways, that's all it is. She remembers their being together while he spends his days trying to get her attention on YouTube and convince her to move back to Texas where he's starting over after having been injured at war. Their memories of each other and enduring love are certainly sweet, but it's all about their path to reconnecting, and the story rather abruptly ends once they're reunited. Perhaps if it hadn't been billed as romance, I would not have been so disappointed, but I feel like I read an entire book of filler for just a hint of future romance in the last few pages.

Nate's a Marine who suffers a debilitating injury while on tour in Afghanistan. If that wasn't enough to kill me (my husband is a former Marine), he starts making YouTube videos while in rehab to try to reach out to his high school love, Hayley. They broke up after a mutual butting of heads and a terrible set of events that left each of them desperate for change – unfortunately they each had a different idea of what was to change....then Nate was shipped out, Hayley graduated, and the two of them physically drifted apart.

But not emotionally. never. Without knowing it, they each clung to the love they held for each other even though they weren't sure the feelings were reciprocated.

Hayley graduates and goes to college. That girl works HER ASS OFF. I have to hand it to her – she is extremely motivated to not become a permanent fixture in her hometown and is willing to deal with the worst of children to make money. BLESS HER HEART. She's part of an amazing a cappella group of girls who are super supportive. I loved them.

Something about Come Back to Texas just called my name. Maybe it's the Southern setting--though I've always felt like Texas is rather a different kind of Southern than my good ole' Mississippi (Maybe I'm wrong! Heck, all I've seen of Texas is the Dallas/Fort Worth airport.)--or maybe it's the promise of a happy ending that I can't resist, but it was simply one of those books that got me excited.

Come Back to Texas is not the speediest of books, when it comes to plot--though it did feel shorter than its near 300 pages. For both Nate and Hayley, life is just about getting through the day. It's much more character-driven and introspective, which is fine for some of us and not as fine for others--just depending on who you are. For me, that's enjoyable. Not only do we see Hayley struggle with leaving her small town for a university many times its size, but Nate's whole days are filled with rehab and finding ways to pass time. This felt largely organic and lets you get to know the characters.

What I wish I saw was a bit more development of the Beats--not the characters themselves, who I got a good hold of--but what they did. It felt like Hayley's life was spent flitting back and forth between things and never spent enough time in one thing. Focusing on the Beats, who are supposed to be the kind of center of the series, would've felt better. There were also a couple of things that weren't quite correct, such as a mention of the "Mason-Dixie" line, instead of the Mason-Dixon line, that were such small things but so glaring to me. Not much of a detraction, but still something that pulled me out of the reading experience.

Even so, I quite enjoyed Come Back to Texas, as I fully expected to. It's filled with sweet moments between Nate and Hayley, and the ending is just so rewarding. I'll definitely be revisiting Nate and Hayley in A Different Kind of Fine and the other Beats in the rest of the series.

I think whether or not you like this book really depends on what kind of reader you are. Being a character driven reader, I know this is something I would love. But some other readers may find it draggy.

I loved Hayley as the main character. I loved her voice and how it really shone through Hendin's writing. I thought her character was awesome and even though she was having a hard time getting over Nate, she was trying her best. It wasn't easy being the poor girl who finally had a chance to break out of the ways of her family – because there was a lot of pressure on her to do well. And even though she wanted to do well, it was hard for her to focus on much when her heart was still breaking.

Then we have Twelve Beats in a Bar, and they are an a Capella group who sing together and found each other at the university. Even though they weren't the main focus of the novel I liked all the secondary characters here. They were each unique and it was easy to see this. I think that future books will be told from one of the other girl's perspective and I would very much like that idea. Oh, and one of the girls is called Olivia so this book obviously gets bonus points for that.

When it comes to plot it was mostly about the breakup. We got to see flashbacks from the start of their relationship until the end, and the reasons which led to the break up gradually become clearer. And we're also seeing the present tense where Hayley and Nate are separate. And I will tell you, in the beginning of the book Hendin uses the chapters to build suspense. You will see what I mean if you read it ;) There isn't much of a plot apart from the love story, so if you don't like no plot twists or stories that drag a little, this might not be for you.

Nate was a guy I liked. In the first few chapters we see him he swears far too much, and that put me off a little. But he grew on me, I guess ^^ The themes in this book are about death, war and love. Hayley is now starting college, a fresh start and a whole lot of new friends. While managing her classes and work isn't easy, it is a great distraction from all her thoughts.

It's been three years, but it's very clear Hayley hasn't moved on at all or hasn't even tried to. Not just that, it seems more time passes the worse it becomes. Now I understand she loved and might miss him, though for me it was at times a bit too much. They were together for one year, and in the way they broke up it's clear they still loved each other. It's rather the fact that Hayley hasn't even really tried, that mostly bugged. As a person I think she's pretty wonderful and a great girl, with an amazing sense of humor. Hayley lives in a small town in Texas. She lives in a trailer home. She is quiet and kind. One day, Nate moves in the house next door. When Nate and Hayley meet they forge a strong bond. But Nate is not from a loving family and when the only relative that was left who kind of loved him died, a part of Nate died too and he didn't know how to handle it.

Nate enlists in the Marines and Hayley gets out of Texas to go to college. Hayley tries to move on for three years

without anything from Nate. She is part of an Acepella band of girls and they are everything to Hayley. But they notice she isn't happy about something and eventually they get out of her what is wrong and that she is missing Nate terribly.

This story takes us through the highs and lows of their relationship, both in the past and the present.

I loved how this story would bounce back and forth from Hayley's POV and Nate's POV. It was interesting to see where they are in the present and where their minds wander to in the past. Hayley is a freshman in college, trying to make ends meet and leave her past behind, but it seems like moving away from home and her memories has brought Nate to her mind more than ever. Her emotions are so frazzled from her new environment, new life, and old pain. Nate is serving in the Marines in Afghanistan and doing anything he can to survive and come back for Hayley, to right the wrongs and tell her that he loves her.

One of my favorite parts about this story is the way that the story will bounce from present to past. It could be from a triggered memory or just an active train of thought and one moment we are in the present and transported to the past. These moments in the past allow the reader to see their young love and how deep their connection was, to understand their past relationship, and the heartache and drama that contributed to who they are today.

In this story, we see a lot of secondary characters. At first it was hard to keep up with everyone. You have all the people from Leland, Texas, and then at college with Hayley, including her a capella group, teachers, and those she works with, as well as Nate's military friends and the many hospital staff members that he interacts with. It was hard to keep everyone straight (especially from Hayley's a capella group) for a while but once the story began to progress it was easy to pick out the different people based on their personalities and story placement. Each character plays a role in this story that is important and meaningful to our two main characters, giving this story a full and vibrant cast of characters.

The YouTube videos from Nate to Hayley made this story stand out among the military romances you find today. It added a level of cultural relativity and the videos themselves are sweet, emotional, and at times you cannot help but smile.
