Nun But The Brave is the third book in the Giulia Driscoll mystery series. It is a well written and professionally edited full length novel.

I just realized a few weeks ago that the author has three earlier books with these characters which take place before Giulia marries Frank. They are pretty hard to find; I ended up finding one on iBooks and the other two in a distant corner of my county library system.

The plot of Nun But The Brave was interesting and fast paced. The mystery elements were very well done.

However, Giulia's behavior was a real turn off for me. (view spoiler)

I recommend Nun But The Brave, despite the elements of the story that disturbed me. This is a very good series and I recommend trying to find the earlier books.

Giulia Driscoll is an ex-nun who runs her own private investigation business. After a recent encounter with a particularly nasty husband, she has decided to stay away from cheating spouses cases, and concentrate on easier things - like missing persons. So when a woman arrives at DI insisting that her twin sister who has been missing for over two months is not dead (as the police seem to believe) but somewhere out there, and likely not of her own free will, Giulia thinks this will be an easy case to solve. Sure, Joanne Philby could have dropped off the face of the earth because she wanted to, but what if she didn't? And therein begins Giulia's strange foray into the world of online dating sites and even stranger foray into the life of Doomsday Preppers...

While it appears at first that Joanne wanted to disappear and create a new identity, small things that Giulia discovers leads her down an entirely different path. Soon she finds herself creating an alter-ego for online dating, one that she hopes will bring her into contact with the person or persons who may have knowledge about Joanne and her whereabouts. But the more she becomes involved in the survivalist cult and its strange leaders, she begins to realize that Joanne is more than likely a victim in all this, and what started out as a missing person becomes something twisted and ugly; and she will need not only the help of her police detective husband Frank and his coworkers, but also that of the one person she hoped never to have to call for help at all...

While Giulia expects this case to be merely routine - after all, how hard can it be to follow up on leads the police already have regarding a missing person? - she soon finds out that it's not going to be that easy. Aside from the fact that she needs to join dating sites posing as a prepper in order to find links to Joanne's disappearance, her brother seems to have gone over the deep end, her sister-in-law is in the hospital under the influence of an unknown drug, two young girls are found dead possibly OD'd from the same drug; and Giulia herself, in her disguise of Maria Martin, may have ingested some of that drug.

But it is what she finds when she temporarily "joins" the prepper community that shakes her very core, and she discovers that secrets have a way of rising to the surface even when you try to keep them hidden from the world...

This book, like all of Ms. Loweecey's, was an absolute delight to read. Giulia is no shrinking violet; she has guts, strength, integrity, and intelligence. She doesn't venture forth into situations unprepared; she keeps her gun and cell phone nearby, and is quick-witted enough to extricate herself from what could be sticky situations. She's a person that is full of life, and it shows through in her character, both in words and actions.

When the book finally ends, and we find out the fate of Joanne and what happened to the girls, it is with a feeling of justice served when all is said and done. The ending is just as it should be, giving us a sense of satisfaction. The writing is brisk, the characters well-drawn, the plot interesting and riveting. Highly recommended.

This is part of an excellent series about a nun turned PI.

Here we have family issues – her brother and his wife and their children for her to deal with, her very new pregnancy, and then there are her clients.

And one of her clients seems to have got involved with a group of people who are preparing to live off the grid just in case of Doomsday.

Now Doomsday seems to be a fad amongst people in certain US states - not so much here in the UK but then we don't have quite as much wilderness for them to get lost in and they certainly couldn't hunt for their meat! Not a legal pastime here.

Now you can watch a reality TV show – on YouTube that was aired on National Geographic and there is a Face book page too: <https://www.facebook.com/doomsdayprep....> And you can play a game based on this too – to get you ready for your own prepping I guess. And if you want support there is probably a group meeting near you. I did find a UK shop for UK preppers and a website so I investigated more. They are trying to prepare for natural disasters as well as man-made – which of course include hurricanes. They have a current blog about the 5 best herbs to know about and they surprised me as to which were chosen:

- Burdock for a poultice for bruises and burns, and a root for carbs.
- Dandelion for detox and diuretic (piss en lit as the French call it);
- Plantain for insect bites, rashes, ski infections. Use in a tea for IBS.
- Yarrow for anti bacterial, anti inflammatory, a ouldice for deep wounds – which follows, and in a tea for high blood pressure and colds;
- Self-heal for fevers and viruses.

I also love the 'voice' of the convent school teacher. Back in the day I ha done too – and got offered several school teaching posts based on it!

As she says: 'in or out of the convent, crabgrass is easier to uproot than Franciscan values'. These being Respect, Compassion, Service and Integrity.

Some notes on items that interested me in the book:

Coffee growing outdoors in the US is very unlikely but possible in a greenhouse – my plats are currently over-summering there – not growing well but they do take 4-5 years to grow to flowering size. Perhaps they should use the type that likes to grow in shady forest?

Sheep cheese – an Italian that has never eaten Pecorino? Seems unlikely to me. We personally love Pecorino. Pecora means sheep in Italian after all. They come in different ages which makes a difference to taste. They are always slightly salty and make a great alternative to Parmesan. The older the cheese is, ie over 6 months, the drier and more crumbly.

I have had read books in this series before and liked them and this was satisfying in its conclusion where all the questions were wrapped up.

This is a very good, funny at times, cozy-mystery series. The whole series is tough to drop in on, this is my third book and I really feel that I've missed a lot by not reading all the other books Alice Loweecey has written in order. Her other series, Falcone and Driscoll Investigations, must lay the foundation of why she left the Convent and how she and Frank meet and fell in love. Strongly recommend you read Alice Loweecey's books in order. Anyway, Nun But The Brave is a very good cozy with a great plot that has

several things going on.

Guilia is hired to find a missing person. Her investigation into the life of Joanne leads her into the sordid world of online dating and into the world of Preppers, those people who plan and prepare and live for the end of civilization as we know it. To say that Giulia is out of her element is an understatement. The only thing she understands about the Preppers is their cult-like tendencies.

When her estranged sister-in-law shows up at her office suffering from a drug overdose and the bodies of two teenagers are found with the same drugs in all their systems, Giulia needs to track down exactly what is going on and why she has a suspicion that it is all related to her missing person somehow.

What I didn't know considering Nun Too Soon was labeled as book #1 is that this is really book 4 (and 6) featuring Giulia as a main character. I kept feeling like I was missing something. Yes, 3 other books and a short novella to introduce this spin off.

I liked the mystery story lines for both books and was happy they were so different. I felt they were well developed and made sense. Despite there being a lot of Catholic issues mentioned, particularly in Nun But The Brave, it wasn't preachy or irritating to me and I have a low threshold for stuff like that.

What I didn't like was how I felt I was dumped into something already in progress. I didn't feel any real connection between Giulia or any of the recurring characters, though Zane was new to the series too. Since I didn't connect with them or care about them, I was a bit bored. Truthfully, I was more interested in why Giulia left the convent and was frustrated on not getting those details. The prequel novella is currently free on Amazon so I'll give it a read and I may have one of the Falcone and Driscoll books which precede this series.

I would really recommend readers start with Force of Habit, what I would really consider the first book.

I got this book as an Advanced Reader Copy clear back in 2016, but I just got around to starting it a couple days ago, and just finished it earlier today (sorry, Alice!).

This is the third book in the Giulia Driscoll Mystery series, but I'd never even heard of the series before winning this copy from a contest last year, so this is the only one I've read. Now I want to read the rest of the series!

The characters were engaging, and I was pulled in from the first page. I have a couple friends who are Preppers (although not to the extent of these guys---they're not convinced the world is going to end any day now, they just want to be ready in case something major does happen---they're not crazy, just thinking ahead) so I've heard some of this before, especially the whole living off the grid idea from one of them. He

would be perfectly happy living without technology, as long as he had an endless supply of books to read and a lantern to read them by once it got dark. Of course, he's not a Luddite by any means, neither of my friends are, they both recognize the value of technology in our society, they just try not to be any more dependent on it than they have to be. They're more like Giulia in that respect---she does her own canning, grows a lot of her own vegetables, and has other skills that a Prepper would find valuable, but she is perfectly content living in a technology-filled world with working indoor plumbing, electricity, and Starbucks. Being a former nun, however, Giulia could also just as easily live off the grid if she absolutely had to...she just wouldn't want to.

Giulia learns way more about Preppers than she ever wanted to when a client asks her to search for her missing twin, convinced she's still alive even though everyone else she talks to (other than their brother) is equally convinced that either the missing woman is dead or missing voluntarily, having decided to start a new life elsewhere...which is where the Preppers come in, as she did join them (briefly) before realizing that particular group had some major flaws that she wanted no part of. Until the last couple chapters, I was convinced the person responsible for her disappearance was one person (in my defense, he really did seem like the most likely suspect) only to realize it was someone else entirely. That doesn't mean there weren't some shenanigans going on at the Prepper community, but they didn't involve the young woman's disappearance.

All in all it was a very clever story, and I learned things I didn't know before about the Prepper lifestyle (and yes, would have been just as happy to not learn, but am not sorry I did), as well as a few things about Catholicism (like what Saint Anthony is the patron saint of...he's actually the patron saint of Native Americans, something I had never heard of before, and he is also known as the "finder of lost articles," something else I'd never heard of before...so two more things to add to my vast store of mostly useless trivia).

The fourth book in the series is supposed to come out sometime this month, which means I'm going to have to start watching for it to hit our local library's new shelf sometime around Thanksgiving, and looking for the first two books, so I can get caught up on Giulia and her world!

Meet former nun turned private eye, Giulia Driscoll. When her sister-in-law passes out in the office of Driscoll Investigations, Giulia discovers that she has O'Ded on some new drug mixture. Then her police detective husband, tells her that they have two dead teenagers from the same drug. Giulia is then hired to find the missing twin sister of her new client. The investigation leads Giulia to using online date sites for the first time, giving her husband and employees many laughs. The missing twin's trail leads to local Doomsday Preppers who grow everything they need, including drugs.

This is the third of four books in this funny and entertaining series. I enjoyed it very much and will be going back to read the other books. The characters are well written (the author is also an ex-nun) and the mystery plots offer many twists, turns and clues before the final outcome.

This is the third book in the Giulia Driscoll series and I have read them all in order. It is not necessary to read them all, but what I have noticed is that Giulia's character, along with Sydney and Zane have definitely developed with each subsequent book and the cases they have dealt with are more detailed and interesting. I love the quirkiness of the DI staff along with her husband Frank and the police she works with. If you have not read any of the books in this series, it will become apparent quickly that Giulia is an ex-nun.

In this book she is hired by a woman to find her missing twin. The police think she disappeared by choice but her family and some of her co-workers and friends do not believe that is the case. As Giulia delves into the case, she ends up going undercover on a doomsday dating service. She meets some interesting people and it becomes a little dangerous for both her and the child she is carrying. We also meet her niece in this story. It was mentioned in a previous book that her brother will not speak to her or let anyone in his family see or speak to her since she left the convent. Her niece wants her to find out what has happened to her mother. She ODs at the beginning of the book which is totally out of character for her. Frank is also investigating the overdose deaths of three teenagers. As the story progresses, Giulia begins to think that all these things are tied together.

This is a very good, funny at times, cozy-mystery series. *Nun But The Brave* is a very good cozy with a great plot that has several things going on, but it is well-written and not the least bit confusing. The pacing of the book was excellent, and the various characters were realistic. Giulia makes several references to being a nun being similar to cult-like living, at least in the subservient, non-questioning side. I recommend this book for lovers of mystery and PI procedure. It has a very engaging and intriguing storyline that I think will appeal to many different people.
