The premise and summary got me hooked onto signing up for this giveaway, but to be quite candid, I was disappointed with the direction the book had taken. The cover threw me off because the girl(and maybe I'm terrible at guessing ages,) looks to be in her late teens/early twenties, but in the book, Angela is much older. The way the book is written doesn't help much either, because Angela's "writing style" (this book is her diary) makes her sound like a silly tween, which awkwardly clashes with her intense flashbacks from her past life: assassination missions, loss of her child, etc. None of the questions raised from her flashbacks are ever answered, the methods of memory recovery have no scientific, nor even fictionally scientific backing (a magical flashback-inducing-miracle-cola called "The Barnstormer", don't even get me started on THAT) and the ending is a complete cop-out. How would Angela, a woman found in Paris with no identity, no credit to her name, nor cash in her pocket (she was literally found naked and unconscious) be able to travel the world after her life-changing experience in France? Yes, I understand that this is fiction, but unless this is completely sci-fi, magic, or alternate universe, some sort of logic must apply.

The title and the cover photo grabbed me right away. Here was someone living through some kind of torment. The table of contents gave me a clue that there was going to be some kind of transformation happening, and quickly. The chapter titles highlighted frames from a life that I needed to know more about. We also learn from the forward how much she has grown as a person and what a deep and wonderful personality she has.

The telling of this story is full of subtlety. The main character, Angela, is recounting her life in the pages of her diary. She is reflecting upon herself, giving us an intimate understanding of her quirks, fabulous sense of humor, sensuality, and inner torment. She doesn't know what has happened to her and what interest other players have in her life. She doesn't know if her memories are reality or fantasy. We are left with questions along the way because Angela doesn't yet know the answers. But by looking carefully at what she tells us and what she does, all the clues are there and crystallize beautifully at the end of her journey.

Recounted as a slice of an incredible life, some situations are harrowing and uncomfortable to experience, others are full of love, kindness, and the thrill of achievement. This is the kind of book that you can cozy up to and it is easy to make Angela your friend because she is so honest and vulnerable...a rare kind of friend that you wish you had. It is clear that this book concludes one frame in her life and takes the first step into the next. I am hoping for, and looking forward to, the next book. I don't want to say goodbye to her.
