I bought this book on Kindle after I heard the author speak about self-publishing. Her presentation was so good that I thought I should give her stories a try! I haven't read many (any?) other self-published books, and I was happy to see Evans defying the negative stereotypes: although this book is a self-pub, it is typo-free and the Kindle formatting is excellent (even better than in some of my major publisher Kindle books). Evans's writing is also very smooth, again, just as good as that I've seen in many professionally published books.

When Elena accidentally-on-purpose gets herself shipped off to an elite experimental boarding school in Alaska, she thinks her worst nightmare is that her archenemy has been shipped with her. But Thane turns out to be the least of her problems as sabotage and mad-science transform their contained environment into a deadly trap.

Things this book does best:

Setting: I love boarding school stories, which was one reason I chose this book. But Evans's school was NOT what I expected. I enjoyed exploring the school's artificial environment, which is super twenty-first century, yet still manages to have that gothic atmosphere.

Acknowledgement of labor: I realize this is a slightly weird thing to be happy about, but so many books about schools just brush over the enormous amount work that goes into making a school run. Evans shows that work happening and actually integrates it into the plot.

Character differentiation: A lot of times, school stories make the mistake of introducing way too many of the student population, and I can never keep them all straight. Evans introduces a manageable number of characters, and clearly makes them different, so they were easy for me to keep track of and didn't bog the story down.

I have to admit, it was a big surprise on my part, as a reader. I was thinking *hey, I'll pick this up for a light read. You know, just to pass time. A pastime.* But it wasn't really about teenage puppy love. Or anything light. It was so much more, but so much less too. And because it was 'so much more', I rated it with 2 stars even if I was thinking of giving it a 1.

It was fast paced with lots of adrenaline rush. You can't even feel the 'love' thing any more and I like the twist (only a little), albeit such a passable twist. Nothing 'wow' with the twist, but still is.

It's not bad. But I wouldn't be reading it again. This is the point where I explain my "**so much less**". Although I liked Elena's and Thane's character, it's not enough for me to rate this even higher. The book lacked something. It lack conviction and substance. There is no craving. You get the feeling that these characters are indeed fictional. A better book for me is being sucked up into their world and believing that

the characters are real. It didn't feel quite the same to me. It needs a good twist, I suppose.

First, you simply have to disregard the above blurb. Basically, it is a YA adventure story that is somewhat, but not too heavily futuristic, with guns (well, maybe one) and running for your life drama, interspersed with trying to win a school competition so that they can go home. It's not a complicated story, and it'll never be a classic, but it was a fun, entertaining story propelled by believable dialogue, consistent characters (as opposed to some heroes or heroines who are said to be everything in the world, spontaneous and finicky, nerdy and popular (Travis from Beautiful Disaster), doesn't-care-about-clothes, but always wears hot clothes (the annoying girl from That Boy)), and plot-driven story. There weren't a whole lot of moments where you're stuck in the main girl's head and in her thoughts and thus, trying to poke holes into the storyline -- authors, that's what happens when the plot drags!!!
