I'm somewhat mixed in what to say here. From the description of this book, I expected a political thriller. Instead, I often thought it read more as a history book chapter about the protagonist Matt Logan, as we follow his rise up the political ranks over about 20 years, as opposed to an exciting work of fiction. I do commend Guarneri's knowledge of politics, which she clearly has a strong knowledge from her many years working in the political arena. But those strengths and personal knowledge don't necessarily save this book, in my opinion. I thought was decent but not really my cup of tea, therefor I would only recommend this if you're someone who's a real huge fan of politics.

See No Evil is a play by play of one man, Matt Logan, and his ascent through the political jungle of the U.S. It's a bit different in terms of style of writing. We go 50 pages before we get actual dialogue, and parts of it read like a relatively dry report of the political landscape Matt is facing. Again, it rarely had dialogue; even between characters it only went back and forth a handful of times before it went back to its paragraphs and regular pacing.

The actual content was definitely engaging. The book chronicles Matt's fictitious career, starting out (relatively) low and achieving the highest command possible for a politician in the U.S. He served as a beacon of what politics should be, someone who stood by his values and did everything in his power to make sure the people of the nation were given the opportunity to thrive. While parts of it were vague (we never know specifically--in most cases--what policy changes he's made) it still brought a story that was well done and interesting.
