There are people who simply won't like this novel. A man who feels that he has been wronged by society at large on the basis of his appearance takes captive a woman who insulted him in a bar. He soon finds that his captive is actually a missing teenager and knows at once that he has put his plan at greater risk as she's a missing child but decides to go ahead with the plan. He's not looking for revenge, he's looking for change. He's looking to mold a human who will accept people as they are and who will finally give him that validation he feels that he needs in being recognized for a superior mind held back by looks and the great need to be liked.

I found this novel quite interesting. Chalk Cutter is an idealist. The ways in which he "molds" Elizabeth are quite brutal - violent but not sexual. Chalk does not see himself as a monster so whatever feelings he

develops during Elizabeth's "change," she's still a child. He gives us quite an interesting backstory of torture and revenge via revelation to Elizabeth and recognizes when a mistake is made. He is a new god, in his mind, but not perfect. The twists and turns this story took were fascinating all the way to the end - which I will not spoil in this review. Chalk makes changes but he makes them at a great price. There's nothing really that I would criticize about the novel except that I would have liked to have seen more of certain elements. This is a well thought out work of fiction that comments on the way we look at society and pop culture/general outlooks and their place in the world in general. If you are a fan of psychological thrillers, this is the novel for you.

Normally I do not choose psychological thrillers to read for pleasure and this outstanding novel by Marc Horn would tend to back up my cowardly decisions! Was there pleasure in reading this novel? One couldn't say that because of the content, however my admiration for this author knows no bounds.

From the first lines, the reader is aware that something terrible is going to happen - and it does, but in a different way. Chalk - unfortunately loved by no one, even his parents - because of his huge round face and tiny features- is pushed to the limit one night when a young woman humiliates him in a bar. Taunted beyond belief by his peers as a child and until he is an adult, this man is forced to live his life alone, purely because of his appearance. Chalk decides to take revenge and show the woman that she cannot judge people by their appearance and so the set of events are set into motion which end in...no spoilers!

Marc Horn takes the reader though a journey into the black side of society, where appearances are everything. If you are not beautiful, you are nothing. I would warrant there are few people in this world who have not been bullied or judged wanting in some way, and Horn's protagonist and victim - Chalk - is set on a downward path from the moment he is born. Chalk's efforts to change society's perspective - starting with Elizabeth - is like watching an approaching train wreck.

It is due to the skillful writing of this author that one sympathises with Chalk, even as his world deteriorates and his mind manipulation of Elizabeth sets off the ultimate tragedy.

Horn poses the question - are the protagonists in this story the victims of societal expectations or their creators? Ultimately, he challenges you - the reader - to decide.
