My sons picked this book, and they loved it! They are into dinosaurs. It was short so it kept their attention well. There are also LOTS of fun words like BOOM BOOM BOOM (as he chases the predators away) and GA-LUMP, GA-LUMP as he tries to run away. Filled with action and humor, this is a fun story.

Parent thoughts:

I liked the book somewhat. The story is fun; and the action words are exciting and fun to read to little kids, especially if you like using character voices. However, I was a bit underwhelmed by the maturity of the text. The author pushes the text to slang and made-up words more than I like. The illustrations, while effective, are not anything to write home about. Again, they work with the story, and are colorful and fun. One thing I **did** like about the book is that it encourages problem-solving: the sauropod has to figure out how to get away from the predators, and the text engages the child to respond to the situation by asking questions. It encourages the child to also explain why different solutions are not going to work, and uses size and shape in the problems. For those looking for dino books packed with scientific factoids, you won't find a whole lot here. The dino theme is just that, and the illustrations and text do not embellish or stay detail-true to dino study.
