I bought this when I was eleven or twelve years old, back when Davao City was still somewhat a pastoral. It ostensibly deals with Callie wanting to join Frank and Joe on their adventures, but actually ties in to a murder due to political corruption. The twist was pretty unexpected, but at least this book shows what empowered women could do.

Callie wanted to aid the Hardy's on a mystery, but they didn't want her to because it is a dangerous business. She wasn't happy about this at all and assumed it was because they don't want to work with a girl. (And someone they cared about was killed in the first book of the series, which makes them a little overprotective - if Callie could look past the "because I'm a girl" thing, she would see the genuine concern behind their words.) But then, Callie accidentally picks up a clue to a real mystery, and the person who lost it is willing to go to drastic measures to get it back.

A breakdown of why I rated it four stars:

#1: Callie really got on my nerves at first. She wouldn't let Frank help at all. Her pride got in the way and because of it, they lost the opportunity to follow up on a vital clue. I assume that Callie's attitude was supposed to highlight "girl power" stuff. However, I thought that Callie made an idiot out of herself and so did Joe. Multiple times. Callie not letting the Hardy's help her with vital information was arrogant. There was a way that if she really wanted to compete, she could have given them a copy of the vital information, but because of the way she handled it, they all lost it. This could have been handled better because all it did was kind of prove the opposite point. (Also see #3.)

That being said, she began to grow on me after a few chapters. :)

#2: Lisa was one of the best supporting characters I've seen in a while. I really like how her character was done. 100% approve. We need more characters like this. Lisa is one of the main reasons this book got a four-

star rating from me and not a three-star rating.

#3: There was someone on the loose who kept mugging people. Yet the girls thought it was perfectly acceptable to walk home alone. And got mugged almost every time. And then spoke about how small and safe Bayport is. Hellooooooo. At least walk in pairs and if you don't want to depend on the men... Also, I'm not trying to say that girls can't do things boys can do or anything like that. I'm just saying, use common sense as to when to put this into practice. Walking home alone at night is a bad idea. The Hardy's even offered to walk them home. C'mon, Callie, if you accept then you get to spend extra time with your boyfriend. Instead, she chose to, as the saying goes, "Bite off her nose to spite her face" and her boyfriend.

#4: The teens (and Lisa whom was older than them by a bit) decided that they couldn't go to the police unless they had sufficient evidence, so they decided that they could find and take down the criminal themselves. Yeah. Great plan. Though I understand it is a mystery, it probably would have been smart to bring in some help in case something went wrong.

#5: During the mystery, they stumbled upon a second crime. This was a neat addition.

#6: Unless I missed something, the title has nothing to do with the mystery. No books before nor after are titled "Hear no Evil" or "Speak No Evil" and I was kind of expecting that and perhaps a bit of a continuation. This isn't a huge deal, but just me being nitpicky.

Overall, I do like this series. They have more action and more developed characters than the more popular blue hardcovers do. It's a shame that they are out of print, but whenever I see one, it's like finding treasure, even if they aren't in great shape. :)
