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Diagnosis: Asperger's Syndrome. Symptoms often only apparent when under stress. Witnessing a murder qualifies as stress. Russ Dante—math teacher, older brother, hobby artist—has a passion for sunsets and finds comfort in his ritual of capturing the striking colors in his sketchbook with oil pastels. That changes one August evening on a secluded park hilltop when—instead of the sunset he came to sketch—he sees a murder. Before the smoky-blue of twilight falls, Russ is running for his life...

There's a lot of nonfiction written about Asperger Syndrome, but very little fiction. In Asperger Sunset, Russ has to deal with the twin challenges of solving a murder and learning more about Asperger's Syndrome, the diagnosis that finally explains the quirks and challenges he's lived with all of his life. While Russ provides the Aspie take on the world, his sister, Misty, reflects the neurotypical. Readers are able to experience both worlds, and, ideally, will come away with a better idea of how each side thinks.

Ok, writing your own review is exceedingly pretentious, but I'd like to think it's a fun book! Murder, mayhem, Madison, WI... an inside look at what it's really like to be on the autistic spectrum, and the frustrations and challenges of being a close friend or relative of someone affected.

I have **mixed feelings** about this book.

On the one hand, **I loved how the theme of Asperger's Syndrome was dealt with**. I recently read *The Rosie Project* and that was the first time I'd ever even heard of this neurological condition, and I was instantly fascinated by the topic. In *Asperger's Sunset* I especially enjoyed the dual POVs, one to illustrate how an Aspy sees the world and himself, and the other to show how the rest of the world, or neurotypicals, perceive him. This book succeeded in being informative (in an engaging way) about Asperger's within the context of the plot in a way that made it easy for people who don't know technical aspects of the condition to comprehend how it works.

On the other hand, **I felt the plot of the book, centered around a murder mystery, left plenty to be desired**. It was just.. so boring. A murder plot invokes (at least for me) ideas of danger, intrigue, suspense, secret plottings. This wasn't what we got. In short, I was expecting *Asperger's Sunset* to be a page-turner. Unfortunately, this wasn't the case for me. It took me a while to get into the story and even when I did **it never really hooked me in a way that made me excited to keep reading. I felt like I was a spectator to the events in the story instead of being invested in them.**

Character-wise:

+ **I really enjoyed Russ's POV.** I loved being inside his head and seeing his perspective of the world. It was really interesting how finding out he had Asperger's Syndrome (and therefore had a *socially accepted* explanation for being different) changed how he viewed himself and helped him deal with some aspects of his life.

- **I hated reaaaally disliked Misty.** As I said before, I appreciated there being a 2nd POV to show contrasting perspectives on the subject of Asperger, but I didn't like Misty particularly as a character. It may be unfair of me to judge her, giving that I have no idea what it is like to have to take responsibility for sby with Aperger syndrome who has so many quirks and differencies, but I still resented how she treated her brother sometimes: (view spoiler). She was downright bitchy and hurtful in certain scenes. Here's an example: (view spoiler)

- **As to the secondary characters.. they were mostly flat.** Penny was the only one I liked; she was kind and since she showed a couple of chinks in her armour and we got some backstory on her she felt a bit more real. But I didn't feel like I knew the rest of the characters at all, and I couldn't care less about what happened to them. I've already forgotten their names.

In a nutshell : I loved the different perspectives on the day-to-day dealings of/with people with Asperger's Syndrome provided by the dual POVs in *Asperger's Sunset*. I am fascinated by this topic and I found Russ (MC) to be totally endearing, and that's where the 2,5 stars come from. However, the murder plot was thin and dull, I greatly disliked Misty (MC 2) who sounded whiny and rather bitchy to me, and the secondary characters were flat. Frankly, **I was a bit disappointed by this book; I was expecting much more.**
