Beautiful! Wordless story of a girl's trip to see The Nutcracker ballet with her mother. Loved the illustrations, the interspersing of the girl and the ballet, and the diversity represented. A lovely book.

I didn't realize that the girl goes to the ballet with her grandmother. I thought it was her mom.

This is a wordless picture book of a girl and an adult woman (mom/grandmom) going to the ballet together. The girl is reluctant. The weather is messy (rainy) and the adult makes her dress up. Things start improving as she sees the stage and the orchestra.

Love the use of color for the ballet. During the ballet, the illustrations alternate between scenes from the ballet and scenes of the audience watching. In particular, we see the girl and the boy she is seated next to.

Strangely enough, she and the boy closely resemble Clara and the Prince. :-) She clearly envisions herself on stage.

That's for mood setting, and because the book title obviously is based on this music. This is a picture book about a girl who really does not want to go to the ballet and wear uncomfortable clothes and sit for a long time. But she goes, and is transformed, of course. There's not a lot of story here, but this is typical of many

wordless stories, where the emphasis is on the emotional experience. The world is drab and ordinary, you see the ballet, and everything is transformed! Visually, this is captured with greater color and movement. Simple, and pretty cool!
