The Gulf of Mexico was rapidly becoming a Dead Zone, the marine life dead or dying, and it threatened to spread through all the oceans. The source of contamination was the leakage of hydrogen cyanide, sometimes

used in gold mining, apparently coming from an underwater tunnel. Multi millionaire and explorer, Sam Reilly and his friend and co-worker, Tom, dive to find the source of the leak and stop it and, in so doing, accidentally discover what appears to be a magnificent unknown Mayan temple and tomb. How had it come to be there, huge and with such incredibly detailed work, so far beneath the water? But before he has a chance to explore further, Sam is asked by another billionaire to join an expedition looking for the fabled Mahogany ship, an artifact Sam and his father had sought without success when he was a youth. Leaving the exploration of the temple to Tom, Sam sets out for Australia.

The book follows the ongoing stories of both explorations. Filled with visual descriptions of the sites and growing supposition of possible histories, the story is packed with excitements and near death scenarios. This reader would have preferred more concentration on the first found Mexican discovery, which seemed to hold far more mystery, but it is the search for the legendary ship which leads to the final, rather disappointing denouement. Easy to read, and very well narrated by David Gilmore, whose pleasant voice has nice pace and good intonation in addition to great individual character voicings, this was an enjoyable, if somewhat unbelievable book in it's latter stages.

Well, as promised, I gave this series a second chance by reading this second installment and again I was deeply disappointed. I thought the writing would've gotten better with the second book (especially if feedback from reviews of the first were taken into account), but it got worse! Not only did the wordy, over-explaining style carry over into this book, but often times the character dialogue wasn't believable because quite frankly no one speaks the way much of this book is written. This is the second book in a series. It is not strictly necessary to read the first book as the stories are standalone. The first book just offers more insight into the characters.

My main problem with this book is that you got the impression that they basically published the first draft without reading through it again. Because of this, there are followup errors to the first book and in my opinion, there is a break somewhere towards the end where the storyline changes completely and it doesn't make sense. And since I'm absolutely my enjoyment of this book was greatly diminished even though I still like the characters and the genre.

The book is about an Australian Legend: the Mahogany Ship. The intro is about the last voyage of the Emily Rose whose crew come upon the MS before shipwrecking themselves. In the present day, Sam investigates a natural catastrophe involving arsenic in the water and finds an underwater pyramid probably Mayan which he suspects was build by the Master Builders. More on that later.

Later the owner of the mine, whose name I have forgotten, approaches Sam and shows him an old Spanish gold coin that he believes came from the MS. More on that later as well.

Right of the bat, the author has two followup errors to the first book. Tom's eyes were described as light green and hazel in the last airship. Here they are suddenly grey and later changed back to hazel. I know that this is a minor issue and that hazel is a somewhat interchangeable color but that was distracting for me all the same. After the owner approaches Sam about the MS, Tom cautions against going by himself as the other treasure hunters after the Magdalena in the previous constantly threatened his life. Also incorrect, as the others looking for the Magdalena weren't after treasure but a biological weapon conceived during Second World War that would have changed the outcome of said war.

Now on to the storylines. In ancient history, there were many cultures such as the Mayans or the Egyptians whose accomplishments are hard to explain even with modern science. The concept of these Master Builders is, therefore, an interesting indeed. However, in this book, it was presented as if any minute now a giant pyramid-shaped ship would descend from the heavens and erect a circular stargate to other space systems. This is partially due to the fact that the story was introduced here but will be continued in later books.

The MS story is actually the one with which I had the most issues. The antagonist hires Sam to find the MS. He believes that this ship was part of Magellan's expedition. I looked it up afterward and the ship being of Spanish origin is actually one of the theories. The antagonist wants to find the ship to prove that the Spanish were the ones who discovered Australia. Somewhere in the middle Tom who stayed behind at the pyramid realizes were he's seen the antagonist before. And he needs to warn Sam about something. At this point, we're still in the Magellan portion of the MS.

And then the author established a connex to the Master Builders at which point all that is completely dropped including Toms unspoken warning. Even the Emily Rose becomes completely irrelevant as Sam gets new information from some hacker he knows, travels to China and then speaks to another witness that points him in a completely new direction.

I want to extrapolate on this point. My issue isn't that at the end of the book the author returned to the age-

old Bond villain who wants to rule the world by finding and using an ancient weapon of mass destruction and/or a vast cache of knowledge. My issue is the lack of a red thread, this break in logic. Where did Magellan go? This was incredibly badly done and sucked the enjoyment out of the story for me. Since they are included in Kindle Unlimited Ill still read the next one hoping that the author doesn't have such glaring logical errors in them as well.
