This is a beautiful and bittersweet tale of two men who are pushing against the boundaries of their lives, but don't quite manage to break free from them. While Max, eponymous night porter at a London hotel, is clearly quite tired of the endless cycle of one night stands with lonely guests, Robert is bound by a life of celibacy-until-heterosexual-marriage -- a life that doesn't really have room for his attraction to men. The connection between Robert and Max is palpable, and readers are constantly teased by what might be, if only they manage to break free.

The writing in this novella is excellent, drawing one in from start to finish. My only real complaint is that the sex scenes, while generally hot, do seem to ignore the issue of refractory periods sometimes. While I appreciate that these guys are horny and really into each other, it does pull me out of the narrative when they're able to get it up again within minutes of orgasm. Unless the person you're writing about is Jack Harkness, I'm not buying it. Nonetheless, this is only one small complaint, and otherwise, I only have praise for this work.

As part of Dreamspinner Press's "Bittersweet Dreams" line, it's no spoiler to say that this book doesn't have a happy ending -- but what I do love about it is that even though the ending isn't happy, it's not without hope. The narrative is left slightly open, allowing readers to hope that one day Max and Robert will break free of their constraints -- whether it is together, or with somebody else.
