Once again, Elin Peer has outdone herself. This book is now tied with *The Genius* for my favorite from the series.

I am enamored with both Hunter and Emanuela. In *The Dancer*, Hunter was left as the token of peace offered by the Northlands, and him suffering the emotional betrayal by Willow, Hunter has a hard time coming to terms with the shock of Willow "choosing" Solomon over him. He feels abandoned and alone when he starts his time playing with the Dolphins and his defenses are in overdrive. He also suffers from the same uncomfortable affliction that every other Nman does: being around women. Throughout the book, Hunter tries to justify his defense against Emanuela because of her actions instead of admitting that he is picking fights with her because he is trying to run away from his own feelings. Not only does he have these reactions to Ema, he has to negotiate his way around other pitfalls like dodging women who are only interested in a physical relationship and interacting with his female teammates. By the time Hunter returns to the Northlands to visit Willow, he has done some soul searching and some rationalization that helps smooth his interactions out with Solomon and Emanuela. His growth is amazing in the book, and I think that's in large part due to him being confronted with different opinions from Motlanders, especially ones who question his methods, like Jonah.

Emanuela is one of the most relatable people in the entire series. While she is a Motlander, and a strong female lead, she also has many of the same pitfalls that the Nmen suffer from. She KNOWS what is expected of her, but, she also doubts herself when she is around Hunter. I'm reluctant to state that this is a love-at-first-sight or that it is enemies-to-lovers type deal. I think Elin did a great job of making Emanuela curious and

rough around the edges to make her the perfect fit for Hunter; she is strong and opinionated and challenges Hunter, but is soft enough to get him to let his guard down. She also seems to be the most strong personality of her siblings as well, which I think helps develop the relationship between her and Hunter.

One of the best parts about this book in the series is that you get to experience more of the Motherlands than you do in either *The Mentor*, *The Seducer*, or *The Warrior*. I'm glad to see that the world-building continues in this book, and all the other characters that you're introduced to in the other books are still impacting the main story lines of each book. I also love that there isn't a clear dynamic between the old-guard (Boulder/Christina, Khan/Pearl, Archer/Kya, Finn/Athena, Magni/Laura) and the new-guard (Marco/Shelly, Solo/Willow, Hunter/Emanuela, Leo/Raven, [Unnamed guy, probably (view spoiler)]/Mila).

By far this book is tied for my favorite in the series. I can't wait for the next books. I will also be sad to see the stories end.

The Athlete, by Elin Peer.

This is the 8th and most mature novel in the ongoing series *Men of the North*, by author Elin Peer.

In it, the two protagonists--Emanuela, captain of the nearly all-female Motherlands soccer team the Dolphins, and Hunter Hercules, star Northman soccer player--battle it out for personal supremacy.

The first half of the book deals with the ever-increasing conflict between the pair, and the efforts of various team coaches and advisors to ameliorate it for the sake of the team. I can just hear the words of former life-coach Elin Peer emerge from the mouth of team psychologist, coach Donna, as she struggles to help the pair come to some amicable arrangement. Some of her suggestions are almost unbearably outrageous, as are the Ten Questions about very intimate personal matters the pair are called upon to answer.

Along the way we are treated to some very deep philosophical discussions about gender, sex, violence, forgiveness, and how to change fixed cultural attitudes that block the way to friendship and understanding. Yet these discussions are never sermons. They emerge from the mouths of various characters who interact with the conflicted pair. Thus, the novel becomes almost a guidebook to personal relationships and how to affect them. Yet it never preaches. It whispers, coaxes, suggests, yet leaves you questioning your own beliefs.

As such, it is almost as if Peer has created a new genre of romantic literature. It is vastly different from traditional romance writing, yet at its heart are still romantic relationships.

The conflict becomes so strenuous that you begin to wonder if the pair will ever overcome their hostility

towards each other. Some of their verbal exchanges are so toxic you wonder if they can ever be forgiven. Yet slowly, gradually, the pair come to realize they have deep feelings for one another and the hostility begins to abate.

So many of Peer's characters contribute to this change. There is Jonah, Ema's brother, the first elected male councilor on the Motherland ruling council. Willow, Hunter's twin sister, from whom he has been estranged by her affair with Solo, her childhood sweetheart. As well there is a cast of characters we have met in other books in the series--Mila, Leo, Raven, Zasquash, Magni, Khan, Pearl.

As a footnote, I must comment on the fact that many of the characters in these stories own pets, and that some of these pets die. If you have ever owned a pet that has come to the end of its life you will know the deep sadness that can overwhelm you, the owner. Peer slips such moments into her writing in such a way that they emphasize the action of the story. This is so cleverly done that they give the reader that real burst of pain that accompanies the death of a loved one. Pure genius writing.

I simply don't know how Elin keeps it all together, and continues to weave one of the most amazing series I have ever read. I take my hat off to this woman who has not only created a new type of romance, but also created a series of great love stories with characters that are unforgettable.
